COLONY, HONEY PLANT AND MARKET CONDITIONS DURING SEPTEMBER 2020

APPALACHIAN DISTRICT (MD, PA, VA, WV): Various varieties of asters, golden rod, sedums and other fall blooming perennials bloomed profusely in the District. The weather was mostly cooperative nectar and pollen gathering albeit the amount was not quite enough to sustain colonies, so Beekeepers kept up with supplying additional food. Overall health is reported to be good as colonies were treated and prepped for the winter. Wholesale honey prices on the Baltimore Wholesale market were \$6.25-7.25 per one-pound container.

ALABAMA: With the exception of Hurricane Sally mid-September, Alabama experienced relatively typical mean temperatures and precipitation that fueled decent floral forage possibilities for much of the state. Goldenrod flourished, yet non-honeybees were more frequently sited foraging. Sentinel apiaries across the state revealed that varroa mite levels were low, but only when appropriate management interventions occurred beforehand. For example, slightly cooler temperatures in eastern central and northern Alabama mid-September allowed for effective formic acid treatments that knocked down mites and had minimal effect on queens. Despite foraging opportunities for colonies, many colonies required beekeepers to diligently assess food reserves, and apply 2:1 sugar syrup when needed. Physical distancing measures implemented because of COVID-19 continued to restrict in-person group events, although smaller socially distanced apiary-level gatherings occurred in a few locations.

ARIZONA: Temperatures in Arizona were at above normal levels during the entire month of September across Arizona, as drought conditions continue across the state. Little or no precipitation was reported across the state during the month.

The main nectar and pollen sources for bees in the state during the month of September was desert plant bloom, alfalfa, cotton; as well as mixed melons in the central part of the state.

Demand and interest in honey remains good across the state. Major concerns are over the continued drought and lack of precipitation across the state.

ARKANSAS: During the month of September temperatures were slightly below normal across most of the state. Precipitation during September was above normal across most of the state due to the tropical storms hitting Louisiana. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, Arkansas had mostly normal soil moisture for September. Too few prices exist to establish a current market price for wholesale white honey.

CALIFORNIA: No report issued.

FLORIDA: Temperatures were about normal for the month. Hot and humid. Precipitation was generally normal with above normal rainfall in many areas. Bee health was considered to be good. Some supplemental feeding was needed for about a week or 10 days early in the month. Spanish Needle, Mexican Clover and especially Brazilian Pepper then began blooming. Brazilian Pepper started a little later than normal, around the 20th of the month. This year's Pepper honey yield is expected to be about normal since there was adequate moisture to optimize bloom. Pepper normally blooms for about a month and should be available until about the 20th of October. It will be October before beekeepers retrieve the honey from their hives, so it will be next month before any estimates of honey yields can be made. More bees than normal are still located outside of the state. Milder fall temperatures in some northern areas may be one reason they have not returned yet. Many beekeepers will split hives and treat for mites after the Pepper season ends. This will be in preparation for the almond pollination season in California early next year. The next major Florida honey season after the Pepper ends will not be until the spring when orange blossom honey will be produced. Stored honey supplies at the end of the month were very light.

GEORGIA: Beekeepers in some areas of the state are having to supplement feeding as rain and a late bloom of wildflowers and Goldenrod are late and not much is coming in. The Fall honey pull was considered lower than average at about thirty percent and losses out of the hives are running about forty percent in most areas. The bees are in good shape heading into the cooler months. Sales are slow for commercial buyers and fair for retail sales. Prices for five-gallon buckets run about \$205-210 and \$2.00 per pound out of the barrel.

IDAHO, COLORADO, UTAH: During the month of September, temperatures in Idaho, Utah, and Colorado were normal to above normal across the entire area. Idaho and Utah experienced slightly below normal precipitation during the month. Colorado experienced normal to below normal precipitation during the month. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, Eastern Idaho had normal soil moisture while Central and Western Idaho had abnormally dry to extreme drought conditions in September. Utah had extreme drought to exceptionally dry conditions across most of the state. Colorado experienced severe to extreme drought conditions across the entire state.

Beekeepers, in all three states, have had to provide supplemental feed for their bees all summer due to the dry conditions. These conditions are making it very hard for bees to find a good source of nectar. Some beekeepers are shipping bees out of state trying to find better conditions. The smoke from the wildfires in California and Oregon is not helping matters at all.

There were too few sales reported to establish a market for local honey.

ILLINOIS: Temperatures for the month of September were higher than normal with four days of heavy rain, otherwise it was sunny and dry with many days without rain. Some beekeepers are having problems with mites and beetles and are treating accordingly with a few small hive beetles and some robbing taking place in weak hives from yellow jackets. Most beekeepers report that their bees are in good to excellent condition. Beekeepers also report a little bit of foliage for their bees to feed on, such as Goldenrod, New England Aster, White field asters, and other various fall-flowering weeds. Production was normal to better than normal. Demand for honey is good at the retail level and fairly good at wholesale level. Prices are generally unchanged.

INDIANA: Temperatures for the month of September were slightly higher than average with only a few days of rain. Beekeepers report that their bees continue to feed on foliage, such as goldenrod. Some beekeepers report their bees in good condition and that they have a healthy population, while others have said that their population is only in fair condition. Beekeepers report a presence of mites and have begun treatment with vaporized formic acid. Some beekeepers report that they have had some production in September. Prices are generally unchanged.

IOWA, KANSAS, MISSOURI, NEBRASKA: No report issued.

KENTUCKY: Kentucky beekeepers normally celebrate September's National Honey Month with farmers' markets, honey festivals and educational talks at schools, but the impact of Covid-19 curtailed all of those activities. The educational opportunities that many associations offer beekeepers regarding winter preparations is taking new forms in Zoom meetings, ad hoc facebook posts, and "pop up" meetings at beekeepers' apiaries. Hive inspections for the Farm Bill Honeybee Health Survey indicated higher populations of varroa mites than normal, and fewer small hive beetles.

LOUISIANA: During the month of September temperatures were slightly above normal across most of the state. Precipitation during September was well above normal across most of the state due to tropical storms hitting the coast. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, Louisiana had mostly normal soil moisture for September. Too few prices exist to establish a current market price for wholesale white honey.

MICHIGAN: Most of September was very warm and bees foraged on Goldenrod and Asters. Some surplus honey was made early in the month from Goldenrod but was sporadic and inconsistent from yard to yard. Beekeepers have been busy checking the hives for honey stores and feeding began for those hives light on food stores. More hive beetles have been spotted, compared to other years. Monitoring and mite treatments are ongoing this month. Demand for local honey is good and most beekeepers are reporting a good crop for the season. Prices seem to be stable in local markets and stores.

MINNESOTA: During the month of September temperatures were below normal across most of Minnesota. Precipitation was slightly below normal to normal across the state. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, most of the state had normal soil moisture conditions during the month.

The overall drier conditions of August provided some fantastic foraging opportunities for bees. Beekeepers reported the bees looked good going into September. As of late September, there was still a little pollen available to the bees from golden rod plants in Minnesota. Beekeepers are now providing supplemental feed for bees due to the lack of enough viable plants to provide nectar and pollen for the bees. Varroa mite loads appear to be lower this fall for most beekeepers. As a good management practice, beekeepers are still treating for varroa mites even though populations appear low. A few black bears were reported snooping around during the month.

Demand for Minnesota honey continues to be good for locally sourced honey. Prices for 2020 new crop range mostly from \$1.45-\$1.55. There were a few reports of spot loads up to \$1.80 but that was for single load sales. There is still a lot of negative talk about imported honey prices affecting the market.

MISSISSIPPI: The bees are in pretty good shape and all the hives have been treated and everything is about shutdown and ready for winter. The bees are feeding off wildflowers and Goldenrod when they can get out and about. Sales are slow but candy makers and retail gift sales are starting to pick up for the holidays.

MONTANA: No report issued.

NEW ENGLAND: New England weather for the month of September featured seasonally warm, milder than normal temperatures with an extended period of summer weather with many locations with record highs for the season. Most of New England has received sporadic rainfall for the entire month of September with many areas reporting heavy downfalls and flooding conditions from the passing of tropical depressions. The entire region has been showing higher level water table conditions than normal.

Early on beekeepers reported huge populations of bees easily filling the entire area of 2 deep for brood rearing with them constantly being used and refilled. In this regard many hives appear strong and heavy. Bees have been working celthra alnifolia, Mexican & Chinese bamboo, fall aster, staghorn sumac, white & sweet clover, thistle, purple loose strife, button bush, assorted wild weeds especially knotweed, sweet pepper bush, assorted wildflowers and particularly golden rod and aster for a strong nectar buildup. Other late food sources still blooming are buckwheat, Indian silk and coreopsis to finish the month. The ornamentals, joe-pye weed, pickerel weed, sedum (stone crop) are out in abundance as well as jewel weed which leaves a slight white pollen mark on the thorax. Overall bees are working hard with a strong population buildup.

Both August and September had positive reports regarding harvesting honey as many beekeepers were harvesting the most ever in many years and considering it better quality than the last several seasons. Early harvested honey reportedly was some of the highest quality and lightly colored ever. At that point in time, harvested honey was averaging 50 lbs. per colony. Beekeepers have been busy concentrating on extracting honey. Demand at all retail/wholesale outlets remains good and honey market prices are steady. Prices quoted for retail 1 lb. bottled units were \$9.00 to \$14.00 mostly \$12.00, occasionally higher, and 1 Quart bottled units were \$18.00 to \$24.00 mostly \$22.00, occasionally higher, inclusive of all varieties, and for all raw and natural honey depending on variety and quality.

Additionally, current prices quoted for 1 Quart bottled units for raw pollen were \$28.00 to \$32.00 mostly \$30.00 and for raw Propolis tincture are \$16.00 to \$20.00 mostly \$18.00 for 2-ounce containers. Beeswax is retailing mostly at \$10.00/lb.

NEW YORK: The central region is awaiting a substantial rainfall to break the drought. We have had so little rain that local municipalities have issued water use restrictions, which is most unusual for this area. Any rain now will be of little use to the fall honey crop as plants are already stressed with little time to recover before the season ends. Bees have fared well in spite of the dry weather; however, mite numbers are elevated which could cause a crash prior to the cold weather. There could be problems as infected bees move from high mite number colonies to clean hives. Honey sales have rebounded slightly with a wide range of prices at local farm stands. Local honey has ranged from \$5.00-9.00 per pound, mostly \$6.00. Wholesale prices could increase slightly as this has been a marginal crop year, compared to last year.

NORTH CAROLINA: Temperatures in North Carolina were near-normal for September with a statewide average temperature of 69.8°F. Precipitation was above normal, with the State experiencing another tropical system during the month (remnants of Hurricane Sally). Overall statewide soil moisture levels were rated 0 percent very short, 5.5 percent short, 81 percent adequate, and 13.5 percent surplus the week ending October 03. The North Carolina Drought Management Advisory Council reported zero counties as having outstanding drought or dryness.

Colony conditions varied by management practices and experience, but most beekeepers spent September treating for varroa mites and preparing for winter. Apiary inspectors reported beekeepers were also checking for winter stores and feeding when necessary. Bees could be seen working Goldenrod, which stretched east from the Piedmont to the Coastal Plains region. Also available in the Piedmont was Heartsease, Smartweed; Aster was available throughout the state.

Commercial pollinator hives were winding down for the season and moved to Florida to take advantage of the Brazilian Pepper tree flow. Demand for replacement bees was seasonally light.

Demand for “local” honey was good, while supply was light. Retail prices at the Raleigh State Farmers’ Market were generally unchanged: \$7.00-\$8.00 per 8-ounce jar, \$12.00-\$13.00 per 16-ounce jar, \$20.00-\$22.00 per 32-ounce jar, and \$18.00 per 44-ounce jar; processed honey, creamed, was \$10.00 per 16-ounce jar. Prices at the Piedmont Triad Farmers’ Market in Greensboro were also unchanged at: \$8.00-\$12.00 per 8-ounce jar, \$12.00-\$18.00 per 22-ounce jar, and \$20.00 per 32-ounce jar.

NORTH & SOUTH DAKOTA: Weather was generally ok, but dry. Harvest for most crops was ahead or well ahead of last season, although soil moisture ranged adequate to short in many areas. Harvest continued full speed while initial preparations for fall were being made.

OHIO: The last day of September is reminiscent of fall weather with 50 to 60-degree nighttime temperatures and golden fields. The Ohio honey crop varied from below average in areas of the Southwest to abundant quantities in much of the northern regions. The extent of the honey harvest is almost directly correlated with the timing and amount of rainfall received in the area. In the Northeast counties, although the fields were covered with Goldenrod, an early frost curtailed the bloom from one more week of flowering and hindered the value of asters. Clover has finished flowering as cool nighttime temperatures continued. Honey harvest in Northwest Ohio was above average this year. The hot and dry conditions this summer were great for bees, although small hive beetles made a comeback. Wax moths seem to be more abundant, making more stressed colonies. The Goldenrod has peaked and winding down, although asters are now blooming, with lots of pollen coming in at month’s end with above-average temperatures. In the West Central region, adequate rainfall helped Goldenrod and Aster nectar and pollen flow. In the Southwestern corner of the state, drought accelerated the display of fall wildflowers with little nectar or pollen available. Goldenrod and Aster are the last major nectar and pollen sources for honeybees and other pollinators, and the last chance for bees to boost their food storage for the winter. The level of varroa mites in colonies has dramatically increased. Due to the high temperatures over the summer, many hives were not treated until late September, giving mites plenty of time to multiply and move to other colonies. Many larger and seemingly healthy colonies die over the winter. Currently, many apiaries are being treated and most of the honey has been harvested. Jars and canning supplies have been extremely difficult to obtain so bottling has been difficult. Due to the work on the Ohio Pollinator Habitat Initiative, we have had more natural nutrition for honeybees and other pollinators. The colonies are strong and treated for varroa mites if needed. COVID19 has had a major impact on beekeeping in many ways this year. Many bee clubs and groups have not been able to meet in person, and new beekeepers have not had proper training for the winter colony prep. Zoom meetings have become very popular within the state. Beekeepers who sell their honey at local festivals have a lot of honey unsold, due to cancellations of events. In the Southeast areas, Goldenrod and Asters bloom is underway. Bees are bringing in good amounts of pollen and some nectar as they plan for overwintering. The bees are taking pollen patties to assist the weaker colonies. Beekeepers are now combining the weaker colonies and preparing the hives for cold weather with mouse guards, entrance reducers and fondant patties. Honey prices appear to be stable with wholesale prices \$5-6 per pound and retail \$8-10 per pound.

OKLAHOMA: During the month of September temperatures were mostly below normal across most of the state. Precipitation during September was below normal across most of the state. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, Eastern and Central Oklahoma had abnormally dry soil moisture progressing to extreme drought conditions as you move West. Too few prices exist to establish a current market price for wholesale white honey

OREGON: No report issued.

SOUTH CAROLINA: No report issued.

TENNESSEE: The fall nectar flow in most areas has been one of the best we have seen in 10 years. Most beekeepers are reporting that their colonies are packing supers with fall goldenrod and aster honey. Most say they will not need to feed this fall. Colonies are strong and actively producing a lot of brood for winter bees. COVID-19 has severely impacted the beekeeper’s ability to sell honey this year with all of the restrictions on farmer’s markets and other outlets where they normally sell to the public. Beekeepers are complaining they are barely covering their expenses for set up and travel at markets. Beekeepers that would bring in \$1000.0 at a particular market are only bringing in \$50.00 to \$100.00 because people are not coming to the market.

TEXAS: During the month of September temperatures were slightly below normal across most of the state. Precipitation during September was slightly above average across most of the state. Hurricanes and tropical storms helped the rainfall average in the Eastern half of the state. West Texas had about normal precipitation for the month. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, most of Texas had normal soil moisture for the month. The only spot of abnormally dry conditions was the far West with one spot of exceptional drought in the Big Bend area.

September was somewhat typical for Texas. After a hot August a few cool days and a little rainfall felt good. Too few prices exist to establish a current market price for wholesale white honey.

WASHINGTON: September started off generally hot and dry throughout much of the state. The dry conditions led to numerous fires across the state (as well as Oregon and California). Disruptions to harvest and the bees that were in the areas where the fires were disrupted. Smoke from local fires was compounded with smoke coming up from Oregon and California fires, causing hazardous air quality throughout the region. later in the month some rains came through which helped put out fires locally as well as eventually clearing the air. Although the rains added to the soil moisture, more was needed.

WISCONSIN: Early in the month there were several cold and rainy days followed by fewer sunny days. Beekeepers have begun combating mites. Some beekeepers report a normal, healthy population of bees, while others report that their bees are only in fair condition. Beekeepers report very little wild foliage for their bees with aster as the only flower remaining. Most say they have begun supplemental feeding of the bees. Normal amount of production reported in September. Demand for honey is good at the retail level and fairly good at the wholesale level. Prices are generally unchanged.
