COLONY, HONEY PLANT AND MARKET CONDITIONS DURING NOVEMBER 2020

APPALACHIAN DISTRICT (MD, PA, VA, WV): November temperatures were above normal for most of the month with daytime highs remaining on average above 55 degrees. It ranked the fifth warmest on record and was the warmest November since 1985. It was also the tenth wettest November on

record with more than eight inches measuring at BWI airport for the month and all of it rain, no snow. Early in the month, record temperatures in the upper seventies were being reached. Several beekeepers reported increased activity in colonies with the warm temperatures and between showers, which is fairly rare for this time of year. There was a spotty, hard freeze in October, but some protected areas still offered wildflower bloom. Beekeepers checked hives post mite treatments and added supplemental food as they prepped colonies for winter. With the warm days, it was easier to assess mite control and several hobbyist Beekeepers reported issues with dead colonies mostly due to mites. Pre-orders for nucs, spring packages, and queens were being offered for spring delivery. Associations were having successful zoom meetings and offering webinars on various beekeeping topics.

ALABAMA: No report issued.

ARIZONA: Temperatures in Arizona were at normal levels during the first half of November and were slightly below normal levels during the second half of the month. Dry, drought like conditions continue across the state. The entire state of Arizona is now under drought conditions, with 72.7 percent of the state under exceptional drought conditions.

Beekeepers are continuing to prepare to move colonies to other locations within the state, or to other states, for pollination of nut and fruit trees. Desert plant bloom was the main source of nectar and pollen across Arizona. Cantaloupes and Honeydews were also a source during the first part of November. Demand for honey remains good.

ARKANSAS: During the month of November temperatures were above normal across most of the state. Precipitation during November was below normal across most of the state. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, Arkansas had normal to moderate drought conditions for November. Too few prices exist to establish a current market price for wholesale white honey.

CALIFORNIA: "The bees are in better shape this year as compared to last year," a California beekeeper said of November conditions for his hives. "We have not seen the massive amounts of loss as we did last year. The bees have significantly slowed brood rearing although some pollen is being collected. We have done some feeding of syrup, but no pollen substitute. We will start with some pollen substitutes around Christmas as the days begin to lengthen and brood rearing begins to pick up."

"Our honey markets have seen some slowing as we sell to restaurants and bakeries with inside coffee shops," he said. "The restrictions placed on our customers have curtailed their use of honey. Sales to the general public remain strong."

Another beekeeper noted that "there was no significant forage available for the bees in November and feeding as necessary was taking place as usual." "Many beekeepers with whom I have spoken are again concerned with the population reductions or total die out in some of their hives that looked great in September/October," he said. "Unfortunately, this has become the 'new normal' that has been repeated for many years now. It is too early to tell how the supply of bees will look for almond pollination in February. We are still awaiting our first significant rainfall this season as everything is still very dry. Another beekeeper reported unseasonably hot weather in late September and early October, "which really hurt late season colony buildup for winter. "I'm hearing of many beekeepers not getting good honey crops and going into winter with their colonies in bad shape,".

FLORIDA: Temperatures and precipitation were about normal for the month. Bee health was considered to be good. Most beekeepers were finishing up mite treatments and hive splitting early in the month. The last few hives outside the state returned to Florida. Spanish Needle and Goldenrod along with a few other wildflowers supplied adequate food for most hives. Melaleuca was also available in southern Florida. Supplemental feeding was only necessary for a small portion of producers. Brazilian Pepper honey was being removed from hives with most beekeepers reporting about average production. Average production is usually considered to be around 70-80 pounds per hive. Prices did appear to be a little lower than reported in late September and into October. Some beekeepers were storing the honey hoping for higher prices later in the year. This resulted in a moderate amount of stored Brazilian Pepper honey at the end of the month with fairly good demand.

GEORGIA: Earlier in the month rain had washed away pollen from several sources remaining for fall and by the end of the month cold weather had kept the bees inside the hives. Beekeepers are checking hives to make sure there is plenty of food in reserves for the winter months ahead and are hoping that the weather cooperates so that they can split hives and prepare them for the Queens in January. Prices remain steady.

IDAHO, COLORADO, UTAH: During the month of November, temperatures were normal to slightly above normal across Eastern Idaho. Colorado and Utah had above normal temperatures during the same period. Precipitation during November was slightly below normal across Eastern Idaho, Utah and Colorado. Western areas of Idaho experienced slightly above normal precipitation during the same period. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, Northeast Idaho had normal to abnormally dry soil conditions. Utah and Colorado had severe to exceptional drought conditions during November.

The overall supply of honey from the Three State area of Idaho, Utah and Colorado was below average in 2020. The current status on bee health is not good. The dry conditions across most of the area has taken a toll on the few remaining bees.

Most beekeepers in the Three State area have moved their bees to intermediate locales until the annual almond pollination period in California. The pollination period usually starts around the middle of February on an annual basis. Locations where beekeepers currently have the commercial bee colonies include Southern California, Texas, and New Mexico. Too few prices exist to establish a current market price for wholesale white honey.

ILLINOIS: The weather for November has had warmer temperatures than usual, with less than average precipitation and two day of light snow. Generally, the bees are in good condition. Beekeepers have treated for mites. No foliage remains. The bees are ready for winter. Demand for honey is pretty good at the retail level and only fair at the wholesale level. Prices are generally unchanged.

INDIANA: The weather for November started warmer than average but ended in line with past year temperatures. There was a normal amount of rainfall with very little snow. Beekeepers report their bees in good condition. Few beekeepers continued supplemental feeding of their bees. No foliage remains. The bees are ready for winter. Demand for honey is good at the retail level and demand was fairly good at the wholesale level. Prices are generally unchanged.

IOWA, KANSAS, MISSOURI, NEBRASKA: No report issued.

KENTUCKY: Due to cooler-than-normal temperatures in October, Kentucky beekeepers found that their hives were broodless by November, a perfect time to treat for varroa mites with oxalic acid. Some also curtailed samples for USDA Honeybee Health Survey two weeks' earlier than normal because of the chilly temperatures and broodless hives. Honeybees were still active, foraging from New England asters, dandelions and other hardier flowers, as recently as Thanksgiving Week. In summary, the weather patterns in 2020 mirrored very closely the patterns of 2012, and because hives were broodless (and hence, no varroa mites were reproducing in the hives), there were very few obvious cases of viruses such as deformed wing virus or Israeli acute bee paralysis virus. The transition from hive maintenance to holiday markets has begun in earnest. Since many farmers markets were affected by mandates related to the spread of covid-19, the KY State Beekeepers Association and Kentucky Department of Agriculture have helped promote Kentucky beekeepers and their products via social media and its newsletter, the Beelines. The holiday catalogue received over 5000 hits on the day it was posted, Black Friday. The information about the federal assistance available to beekeepers via the Corona-virus Food Assistance Program (CFAP) was also distributed to KY beekeepers via Zoom presentations and the Beelines newsletter.

LOUISIANA: During the month of November temperatures were above normal across most of the state. Precipitation was normal to below normal across the state. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, Louisiana had mostly normal to abnormally dry soil moisture for November. Too few prices exist to establish a current market price for wholesale white honey.

MICHIGAN: The first half of the month brought summer-like temperatures to much of the state; highs in the high 70s and a few 80s and lows dipping back into the high 20s and 30s across much of West Michigan. Beekeepers would normally be happy with these temperatures; however, they also coincided with corn combining season. The possible threat of neonicotinoid dust made from combining settling on remaining Asters, Goldenrod, Witch Hazel and Honeydew could potentially be a problem if the bees were working those days going into overwintering. However, there were few reports of flights of bees with nothing left to forage. It is best that bees stay quiet in the hive and conserve energy to overwinter. The extra warmth also allowed beekeepers time to complete last inspections, mite counts and treatments. Some orange pollen and cream-colored pollen were observed mid-month going into the hives. Earlier in the month, beekeepers finished treatments for mites with Oxalic acid. Hives had been fed prior to the cooler weather and mouse guards were placed on the entrance for the winter. Many of the beekeeping supply companies offered sales during the month and those who are planning for the following season had an opportunity for great deals on new equipment and supplies. Sales of honey in local stores and markets continued to be heavier than in the past months with prices holding steady. Private sale honey was reported selling from \$5-10 per pound. Many beekeepers are reporting good supplies on hand. In the Southeast, warmer temperatures made fall treatment applications and feeding easy. When queried, respondents admitted to not knowing mite counts or when treatments were applied, although continued Colony Collapse Disorder was prevalent. Larger colonies seem to be at the greatest risk.

MINNESOTA: During the month of November temperatures were slightly above to above normal across most of Minnesota. Precipitation was normal to slightly above normal across Northern Minnesota. Central and Southern Minnesota had normal to slightly below normal precipitation for the month. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, most of the state had normal soil moisture with a few areas of abnormally dry conditions in the Central and Southern parts of the state.

During November beekeepers continue to be busy feeding colonies as needed. In some cases, this was the third feeding this fall. Corn syrup and pollen patties were the main supplemental feeds utilized by commercial beekeepers. Commercial beekeepers head their bees into warmer locations including Southern States and California.

Demand for Minnesota honey continues to be good for locally sourced honey. Prices for 2020 new crop range mostly from \$1.45-\$1.55. There were a few reports of spot loads up to \$1.80 but that was for single load sales.

MISSISSIPPI: Everything is pretty much shut down until winter passes. Hives have been checked, treated and the bees are reported to be in pretty good shape. The cooler weather has the bees pretty much staying close by or stuck in the hives and beekeepers are hoping they have plenty of food in reserve. Sales are about steady and prices remain the same.

MONTANA: No report issued.

NEW ENGLAND: Weather for the month of November featured milder than normal temperatures with daytime highs in the 40s and 50s with well below average precipitation resulting in severely low soil moisture levels for the entire region. Due to the warm weather, the bees have been working off the remaining late blooming floral and pollen sources such as blue gentian, buckwheat, mint especially mountain mint, wing stem, teasel, figwort, burdock, purple coneflower, heather, boneset, fireweed, ironweed, star thistle, and particularly aster and golden rod, knotweed and various fall wild flowers. Pollen and nectar sources have diminished with very few sources remaining, which are hard to identify which ones the bees are using. Honey flow and colony population buildup has finished at the end of the month. In New England, hive losses during the winter months can best be attributed to most of the following: varroa mites, starvation, poor nutrition, queen failure and performance, pests that bring on diseases and virus, environmental toxins and lastly poor management practiced by beekeepers.

Overall perception is that New England hives have required heavy feeding this year due to little nectar flow in August/September. Aside from the low honey crop is the additional problem it creates for colony growth. Limited pollen and nectar mean less brood and poor nutrition. This will likely contribute to creating a greater winter loss as many colonies are light and their winter bees were not developed under the best of conditions. Keepers took advantage of the later fall warmer temperatures by combining weak colonies to form strong ones and re-queen for a strong spring build up.

The vast majorities of beekeepers have finished with their integrated pest management programs and have applied the last of their formic acid and oxalic acid treatments. Hives are being winter prepared by shielding them with wind breaks and plastic sheeting to abate harsh wind and severe cold.

Beekeepers report colonies to be in good to very good condition with mite problems under control. State inspectors report that hives are in good condition. Hives are healthy with low mite levels and have built up well in population. The region has exhibited a mixed bag relative to amounts of honey production reported. Most keepers have secured their hives for the winter.

NEW YORK: It has been a very mild November. Beekeepers are uncertain as this unusual weather creates unusual conditions that require more additional to manage. While warmer temperatures are helpful for completing yard work, it is not great for bee health and longevity of colony supplies. With floral sources done blooming, weak colonies get robbed spreading mites and their virus loads. Active colonies also consume more reserves that were meant to carry the hive through the end of winter. This creates more work for the beekeeper, who now needs to watch for crashing colonies and prepare for mid to late winter feeding, unless your hives are being sent south. Thus far, things look good, with an occasional collapsing colony. Late season summer-like weather allowed bees to store reserves on the tail end of the flow so most had ample nectar and pollen. Beekeepers often place on an additional pollen patty and wither combine and/or feed the lighter colonies. With the extended seasonal temperatures, everyone should have gotten pre-winter tasks completed. The drought impacted Japanese knotweed or "Bamboo" and there have been additional calls for dark honey in the regional wholesale markets. Overall, honey sales have remained steady and the fall flow was better than expected, given the drought that occurred in the central regions of the state. Recent rains have slowly been replenishing the aquifers and streams have begun to flow slowly. Prices remained steady with the holiday season starting to impact sales; a good snowstorm would boost light honey sales and would get the tea drinkers out looking for good light local honey. Unfortunately, the pandemic is still impacting café and restaurant sales. College towns, which rely on students and their families for local shopping, are also still being negatively impacted.

NORTH CAROLINA: Temperatures in North Carolina were above normal for November with a statewide average temperature of 55.2°F. Precipitation was also above normal, with the State experiencing heavy moisture from Tropical Storm Eta. Overall statewide soil moisture levels were rated 0 percent very short, 1 percent short, 74.5 percent adequate, and 24.5 percent surplus the week ending November 28. The North Carolina Drought Management Advisory Council reported zero counties as having outstanding drought or dryness.

Inclement weather, from irregular precipitation to above normal temperatures, continued to affect foraging. When conditions allowed, bees could be seen working Aster; Heartsease, Smartweed; Bitterweed; Joe-Pye Weed; Sunflower; and Goldenrod.

Commercial pollinator operations continued to rest and replenish hives in preparation for the California almond pollination season in February 2021. Replacement bee operations were also resting and replenishing hives; demand for bees at this time is seasonally light as beekeepers do not want to feed and protect them throughout the winter.

Demand for honey is seasonally light but is expected to increase during the holiday shopping season. Supply is light with many beekeepers already sold out. Retail prices at the Raleigh State Farmers' Market were generally unchanged: \$7.00-\$8.00 per 8-ounce jar, \$12.00-\$13.00 per 16 ounce jar, \$20.00-\$22.00 per 32 ounce jar, and \$18.00 per 44 ounce jar; processed honey, creamed, was \$10.00 per 16 ounce jar. Prices at the Piedmont Triad Farmers' Market in Greensboro were also unchanged at: \$8.00-\$12.00 per 8-ounce jar, \$12.00-\$18.00 per 22-ounce jar, and \$20.00 per 32-ounce jar.

NORTH & SOUTH DAKOTA: No report issued.

OHIO: The month exhibited a similar trend of extreme conditions as most of the season: heavy rainfall in some areas and no rain elsewhere within a short distance. Temperatures also varied; Cincinnati dropped to 26 degrees on November 2, then rose to 80 degrees a week later! High winds blew over trees in Northeast Ohio mid-month with gusts as high as 79 mph near Lake Erie. Naturally bees responded to the warmer conditions and were flying during those days! With meager sources of nectar and pollen, foragers may have visited grain bins, feed lots and birdfeeders to pick any small, fine-textured item that "looked" like pollen to the hungry bees. In the Southeast region, the weather has also been mild, and bees were able to fly and take in lots of dry pollen substitute and sugar feed. With winter just around the corner, they will need all they can store. Now is the time to start planning for early spring and applying the feed that the bees will need to build up. The Ohio "locally Adapted honeybees" are going into winter heavy with honey stores. Mite populations are under the danger threshold of less than 1 per cent. The weather has been mild and a little above normal allowing bees to fly often, feeding on dry protein from feeders. Colonies have been wrapped with upper ventilation and insulation in the process of being completed. Rainfall has been above normal and provided moisture for trees and pollinator plants going into the winter season. Beekeepers with commercial bees (not adapted in Ohio) have high mite populations: many colonies are light in weight, and some have already died. In Northwest Ohio, a killing frost on Halloween that ended blooming flowers. The bees are somewhat clustered for winter and even with the record heat recorded the first weekend in November, little flight time was observed except for a few cleansing flights. Honey prices remain stable from \$5-6 per pound wholesale and \$8-10 per pound retail.

OKLAHOMA: During the month of November temperatures were above normal across most of the state. Precipitation during November was below normal across most of the state. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, normal to moderate drought conditions exist across most of the state. Too few prices exist to establish a current market price for wholesale white honey

OREGON: No report issued.

SOUTH CAROLINA: No report issued.

TENNESSEE: In Tennessee there are still some small wildflowers producing nectar and pollen across the State, not enough to call it a nectar flow but it is supplying fresh nectar and pollen to the colonies. Although honey production across the state appears to have been better than average this year covid-19 restrictions have caused many beekeepers to have little to no income from honey sales. Most beekeepers across the state sell the bulk of their honey at farmers markets, festivals, fairs and other venues. Cancellation of these venues has been financially hard on the beekeepers. The number of people coming out to farmers markets has been extremely low resulting in little to no honey sales. Several beekeepers that rely on honey sales at these venues for a living have reported that many times they do not sell enough products to pay for their setup and travel to the venue.

On a positive note, beekeepers across the state are reporting that their colonies are in better shape going into the winter than they have been for many years. Hopefully this will result in stronger colonies next spring with fewer overwintering losses. We have had a few cases of bears destroying colonies this fall.

TEXAS: During the month of November temperatures were above normal across most of the state. Precipitation during November was slightly below average to well below average across the state. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, November drought conditions copied October. Central and Eastern Texas having abnormally dry to severe drought for the month and West Central to far West Texas having moderate to exceptionally dry conditions.

Texas is unique in a lot of ways and Beekeeping is one of them. 2019 records show 132,000 honey producing colonies producing 7.4 million pounds of honey in the Lone Star state. Most of these are held in Texas over the winter and moved to other states beginning in February. Because Texas does not require apiary permitting or registration it is very difficult to keep an accurate tally of hives and production. Too few prices exist to establish a current market price for wholesale white honey.

WASHINGTON: No report issued.

WISCONSIN: November started with two very cold days, then moved on to a week with high temperatures in the 70's, then temperatures dropped into the normal range. There was less than average rainfall with a small amount of snow. Beekeepers have prepared for the winter. Beekeepers report that there is no more wild foliage for their bees. Most beekeepers report no problems with insects, and some have finished treatment for mites. Some beekeepers have finished feeding their bees, while a few others continue to feed them. Most beekeepers report that their bees are in good condition and are ready for winter. Demand for honey is good at the retail level and fairly good at the wholesale level. Prices are generally unchanged.
