APPALACHIAN DISTRICT (MD, PA, VA, WV): May's weather was near normal for most of the month interrupted by days with warmer or cooler than normal temperatures. The cooler days did affect pollen and nectar gathering. Precipitation was about average to above average and soil moisture levels adequate to surplus. Beekeepers reported active brood rearing and active swarming. Winter losses are being reported around 40-45% throughout the District. Tulip poplar had an excellent bloom as did black locust and various wildflowers despite the April freeze. Strawberries that weren't hit by the cold offered excellent bloom as well. Beekeepers are actively visiting hives, adding supers, controlling mites, checking queens, and trying to control swarming.

ALABAMA: Packages continued to arrive to beekeepers across the state during the first half of the month. Sustained physical distancing measures as a result of COVID-19 meant that mentorship opportunities, especially between new beekeepers receiving packages and those with more experience, were limited. The regional Stay at Home Beekeeping Series (presented by The Alabama Cooperative Extension System, Auburn University, University of Florida, University of Georgia, University of Tennessee, and Texas A&M University) delivered two episodes through web conferencing and social media platforms that were focused on honeybee health. The southwest part of the state experienced abnormally dry to moderate drought conditions, whereas the rest of the state experience typical levels of precipitation but below average temperatures. Clovers, blackberries, dandelions continued to bloom in most regions, while Chinese Tallow bloomed in the far south. Despite presence of flowers, honey production was inconsistent. Levels of varroa mites and European foulbrood remained generally low, but small hive beetle levels continued to rise.

ARIZONA: Arizona has seen the return of all of its bee colonies for the late spring and summer season. So far, it has been a productive season for bees in Arizona. Temperatures during the last week of May were at above normal levels, but for the other parts of May, were at ideal levels.

Wildflowers and desert plant bloom have been actively growing and abundant in the state, especially in the northern part, which has greatly enhanced sources for bees. This was followed by the melon season in south and central Arizona, providing cantaloupes, honeydews, watermelons, and mixed melons for nectar and pollen sources.

Sales increased as the month progressed, due to the return of bees, the abundance of sources, and the reopening of businesses across the state.

During the first part of May, several companies and retailers were closed, but with the lifting of many restrictions concerning Covid-19, virtually all businesses are now open. This, coupled with the opening of neighborhood stores and stands for the Memorial Day weekend and beyond, has led to an increase in interest and availability.

There was some early concern over the possible risk of murder hornets to the Arizona bee communities, but this was short lived, as Arizona weather is not conducive to them.

Interest in honey across the state remains good. The biggest concern at this point going into the future is the continuing lack of water, and the need for increased precipitation in the near future, before the threat of drought like conditions returns to the state.

ARKANSAS: No report issued.

CALIFORNIA: California beekeepers say that following a successful almond pollination this winter, they've emerged into spring and early summer largely unscathed by the Coronavirus pandemic. "You know, it really hasn't affected us," said one beekeeper who works hives in the Sierra Nevada. "We're free to travel. We're in the boonies most of time, so we don't have much contact with people." "I guess we're indispensable or something like that," he added.

Though some beekeepers lost restaurant and bakery sales because of the virus, consumers may have bought more because of stay-at-home orders. One beekeeper said he was still getting \$2 per pound for his honey, though he had heard lower prices in the Midwest, around \$.1.50-1.70, because of increased Asian imports.

Some beekeepers say almond pollination went well enough that bees gained more weight than in previous years, which required hives to be divided. "We produced a considerable amount of honey in the almonds, took off some of it and left the rest on for feed," one said. "I am glad we did! The bees made very little sage honey, and are now needing to be fed."

February was one of the driest on records for the almonds, and storms since then hurt colony buildup for some hives. Buckwheat and wildflowers looked good but failed to produce much nectar. By mid-June, California beekeepers were placing hives in alfalfa fields. Area bees were working blackberries, as well as watermelon and squashes in the San Joaquin Valley. Though wildflowers were mostly dried up, bees were able to forage on toyon in the mountains and safflowers down below. Conditions for queens looked promising. "This year's queens we purchased have all started out better than last year, with much fewer failures, although we are seeing some drone laying queens starting to appear," a beekeeper said. "The swarming was very intense, and about 50 percent of those colonies have caught good queens."

FLORIDA: Temperatures were about normal for the month with below average precipitation until late in the month. Afternoon showers became more prevalent during the last week or so of the month. Many beekeepers were treating for mites early in the month and reported good results. Bee health was considered good. Sources of food included Spanish Needle, American holly, gallberry, palmetto and in the Panhandle Tupelo and titi. Cabbage palm also started blooming late in the month, almost two weeks ahead of normal. Tupelo honey production appears to be very low this year. One reason could be much lower humidity levels than normal when it started blooming. The Panhandle area saw several very dry fronts stall over them resulting in the low humidity levels. Gallberry honey production also appeared to be much lower than normal with some sources estimating only about one half of a normal honey yield. Small honey producers were still reporting very good sales of mostly wildflower honey at local stands at steady prices from last month. Orange blossom honey had very light supplies by the end of the month. Many commercial beekeepers did not sell much honey during the month. They were allowing some honey to accumulate for the hive as they were splitting hives to increase their numbers of bees available for next years California almond pollination season. Some beekeepers are selling hives to California beekeepers both before and after the almond pollination season ends. Selling hives out west instead of paying the trucking freight back to Florida is another way Florida beekeepers are trying to increase their profitability.

GEORGIA: Honey producers had a wet month throughout most of the month. It has been considered a wet year. Most of the honey has been pulled and the beekeepers are feeding the bees to keep them in good shape. Melon and vegetable fields along with plenty of wildflowers are available for the bees to gather pollen and stay busy when they can get out of the hives and flourish. The honey is reported to look good in color and quality, however bulk sales seem to be very slow at this time and retail is doing rather well. Prices: 5 gallon \$180 barrel (600lbs) \$2,000

IDAHO, COLORADO, UTAH: No report issued.

**ILLINOIS:** Below average temperatures; above average precipitation. Some areas in the middle of May received over 10" of rain in a five-day period. Some had problems with flooding and many beekeepers were unable to get into their bee yards. Shortly after the 20th of May, temps climbed into the 70s and low 80s. Bees were feeding on honeysuckle and the end of fruit bloom. Black locust is late this year and will be blooming soon. Excellent demand with the Covid-19 crisis. People tend to be hoarding and honey is flying off the shelves. No change in prices. Farmers' Markets have many new restrictions. Customers must use credit cards. Workers cannot touch cards but only offer the device to customers. No change/bills interchanged. You cannot use customers' bags unless you do not touch them. Many have pre-order only for Farmers' Market.

**INDIANA:** Temperatures were just about average, except for a cool period during the second week of the month. Rainfall in most parts of the state was higher than average for this time of the year. Beekeepers report that their bees continue to feed on wildflowers, such as White Dutch Clover and Black Locust. Beekeepers report their bees are in good condition. Demand for honey is good at the retail level and fairly good at the wholesale level. Prices are generally unchanged.

**IOWA, KANSAS, MISSOURI, NEBRASKA:** No report issued.

**KENTUCKY:** The Kentucky beekeeping community held its collective breath as spring temperatures plunged to historic lows (27F in the Bluegrass) in the first weeks of the May. Normally, a time of mild temperatures, this year has proven unprecedented for low temperatures, prolonged rain, and interrupted nectar flows. As a result, queen bees have had difficult mating periods, some hives are showing signs of disease such as European foulbrood (3), a possible case of American foulbrood (the beekeeper self-identified and burned the colony), and 1 case of chalkbrood. Although there is little that beekeepers can do to control the weather, they have had more time, due to the "work at home" schedules due to the Covid-19 virus and have been able to catch swarms. Although the tulip poplar, a major source of nectar in KY, did not come through the mid-May freeze unscathed, other flowering plants such as blackberry bushes, yellow clover, and bush honeysuckle have provided nectar for the hives. Some beekeepers have begun to harvest honey at the end of May. Because of the coronavirus still dictates Kentucky schedules, many bee associations have begun using Zoom or teleconferences to hold meetings. At this point, the KY State Beekeepers Association is continuing to plan for the KY State Fair in August and move forward with the Certified Kentucky Honey Program.

**LOUISIANA:** No report issued.

**MICHIGAN:** Early in the month, temperatures were warm with pleasant conditions as hives began building nicely, before turning cooler. Bees brought in nectar and pollen from dandelion, cherries and blooming peaches. As the weather turned cooler with periods of rain, the bees were restricted on foraging and weaker hives began to run short on food stores with some requiring feeding. Stronger hives with adequate stores continued to expand; however, hives with limited stores contracted their brood nests and queens quit laying. The latter 10 days of the month brought some warming with more rain and flooding. During this time, the crab apples, apples, and invasive flowering autumn olive yielded good nectar flows with much-needed pollen. Currently Dutch clover is beginning to bloom and will become prominent in June. Swarming season is near peak at the end of the month. Sales of local honey have been brisk in stores, markets and those with on-line sales. Prices have remained steady with those who have remaining supplies. Retail prices range from \$7.00-10.00 per one-pound jars and \$11.00-15.00 for queen-lines two-pound jars. No local club meetings, except those having on-line meetings. Michigan State Extension personnel have also been conducting virtual meetings on bee-related topics as well as question and answer sessions for beekeepers.

**MINNESOTA:** No report issued.

**MISSISSIPPI:** Beekeepers are busy getting the honey ready for marketing later. Plenty of rain during the month, but the bees are reported to be in very good shape and feeding well when they can get out and about from the hives. Sales are about average but still considered slow at this time. Prices remain steady.

**MONTANA:** Mixed temperature and scattered moisture were generally experienced across Montana for the first half of May, while the last half of May was generally warmer although windy at times. Topsoil moisture measurements at the end of May measured 2 percent very short, compared to 2 percent last year; 12 percent short, compared to 10 percent last year; 86 percent adequate, 80 percent last year; and 0 percent surplus, compared to 8 percent last year. Subsoil moisture measured 10 percent short and very short, while 90 percent of the subsoil moisture measurements were adequate or surplus. According to the June 9, 2020 U.S. Drought Monitor survey, abnormally dry conditions existed in areas of southwestern through southcentral Montana and in the northeastern corner along the Missouri, and Yellowstone breaks.

Beekeepers maintained and distributed home hives across Montana with early native plants available for pollen and nectar. Traveling Montana colonies at other locations included Oregon and Washington State where any remaining cherry, soft fruit, apple, pear and berry blooms finished in relatively cool, wet, and windy conditions over the course of May. By months' end, most of these colonies were returning to Montana.

**NEW ENGLAND:** New England weather for the month of May has been wet and cooler than normal. The weather exhibited a pattern of cooler, unstable temperatures with a mixture of some mild to warm days and some cool to cold temperature days. Precipitation for the month was about normal with all regions reporting high moisture levels that helped push earlier than normal ornamental and floral sources for pollen and nectar such as dandelion as well as ornamental Japanese or blood good red maple and crab apple. Additionally, pin cherry and black cherry, which offers a green pollen source, henbit, offers red pollen, and sugar maples, will provide yellow pollen. Later in the month there was box elder which is huge pollen and nectar source and Bell's honeysuckle, which provides delicious pollen and nectar. Reportedly, some keepers have addressed fruit grower needs especially apples, by setting up beehives no later than the 2nd week of May. This year pollination fees are set at \$125.00 to \$150.00 mostly \$130.00 per hive with 4- hives per pallet and a 1- pallet minimum. Pollination hives have been deployed to apples, blueberries and other earlier crops but were cut short by continual rain especially on weekends and cool temperatures. Hopefully growers had enough pollination to set a crop. There were no reported strong frost conditions in New England, however the region did experience a strong snow covering event for the entire area but with higher temperatures returning, the snow quickly dissipated. Many keepers early on had observed pollen frenzies at the front porches of their hives, mostly cream colored and orange pollens as activity was intense.

Regionally, the major portion of spring nectar flow emanates from chestnut and black locust bloom. In full bloom are sources such as apples, apricots, plum, pears, red currant, wild plum, pin cherry, choke cherry, and blueberry. Bees are actively collecting from other pollen and nectar sources such as greater celandine, dogwood, honeysuckle, numerous clovers, mostly sweet clover, lilac, mustard, glossy buckthorn, hawkweed, mint, chive, black

cherry, wildflowers and other flowering ornamental trees and shrubs. Reportedly, the high moisture levels are creating higher floral nectar levels than in previous years, therefore as soon as New England gets consistent, warm temperatures and sunshine, beekeepers are anticipating a good honey flow year. Mating flights require sun and temperatures at minimally 75 degrees F. Purportedly, many hives have had good brood that has been hatching during this wet weather and the congestion is likely to stimulate the swarming impulse as swarms are expected to be prolific around Mother's Day every year.

Already reports of swarm activity are very high and problematic for those who did not make splits and put off supering. Reportedly health wise, overwintered hives are doing extremely well with lots of brood building up with full foundation expansion and plenty of forging/worker bees and Nuc production is normal.

Purportedly, the main pest problems regionally have been varroa mites. In New England, keepers have been using hop guard, mite-away II and III or formic & oxalic acid to fight against varroa/tracheal mites and chalkbrood. Keepers report that bees are primed for comb building and expansion at this time of the year especially regarding reversing hive bodies. Comb renewal is part of ensuring a healthy environment for the bees as it removes possible contamination from the hive and relieves that stress on the bees. Hive body frames need to be replaced every 5 or so years for health hive sustainability. Mid May through the end of June is a major honey producing period and keepers are hoping June is sunny thus giving bees a chance to catch up.

Demand at all retail/wholesale outlets remains good and honey market prices are steady. Prices quoted for retail 1 lb. bottled units were \$9.00 to \$14.00 mostly \$12.00, occasionally higher, and 1 Quart bottled units were \$18.00 to \$24.00 mostly \$22.00, occasionally higher, inclusive of all varieties; Additionally, current prices quoted for 1 Quart bottled units for raw pollen were \$28.00 to \$32.00 mostly \$30.00 and for raw Propolis tincture are \$16.00 to \$20.00 mostly \$18.00 for 2-ounce containers.

**NEW YORK:** A month of extreme temperatures with a chance of frost in the central regions of the state at month's end. Bees in yards have started to swarm with some colonies with excess stores of dandelion honey. An infrequent event most likely due to the delay of 3-4 weeks of mass dandelion flowering. Many plants have had delayed flowering due to the unusual cold April. Sumac has just now started to leaf out. Unusual weather years often have caused deviations in the "usual" flow of nectar and colony growth and can cause unusual colony health concerns. Mite numbers are increasing as increased colony growth and must keep awareness to the impact on production later in the year. Mite treatment window will end once honey supers get placed. Honey sales have been slow especially due to reduced opportunities in visit restaurants and cafes. Roadside honey sales have remained good. Prices for wholesale and retail sales have also remained steady. A container of local varietal honey is being sold for \$7-9 per pound at retail outlets, with supplies light. Anyone with surplus 2019 honey should have a ready market of bulk sales to other beekeepers running low.

**NORTH CAROLINA:** Temperatures in North Carolina were below normal for May with a statewide average temperature of 63.7°F. Precipitation was above normal with the State already seeing two named storms, Tropical Storm Arthur and Tropical Storm Bertha! Overall statewide soil moisture levels were rated 0 percent very short, 0.5 percent short, 45.5 percent adequate, and 54 percent surplus the week ending May 30. Once again, the North Carolina Drought Management Advisory Council reported zero counties as having outstanding drought or dryness.

The cool, wet weather negatively impacted breeding, according to apiary inspectors, resulting in several new queens having to be replaced. Otherwise, most hives appear healthy with only a slight increase in mite pressure noted. Weather permitting, bees could be seen working Sumac, Black Gum, Holly, Raspberry, and Tulip Poplar across the state. Dandelion, Black Locust, Persimmon, and Ladino White Clover were available in the Mountain and Piedmont regions. Also, available in the Piedmont region were Clovers (Aslike, Crimson, and Sweet), Vetch, and Privet. Huckleberry, Tupelo Gum, and Gallberry were blooming in the Coastal Plains region. The weather also had a negative impact on the nectar flow this spring leaving apiary inspectors estimating a below normal honey harvest.

Some commercial pollinator hives moved up the East Coast to New Jersey, and later Maine, for blueberry and cranberry pollination. Others remained in North Carolina preparing to move bees to watermelon fields and other summer crops, however, the unseasonable weather has severely delayed production in many growing regions.

Retail prices at the Raleigh State Farmers' Market were unchanged: \$7.00-\$8.00 per 8 ounce jar, \$12.00-\$13.00 per 16 ounce jar, \$22.00 per 32 ounce jar, and \$18.00 per 44 ounce jar. Prices at the Piedmont Triad Farmers' Market in Greensboro were also unchanged at: \$8.00-\$12.00 per 8 ounce jar, \$12.00-\$18.00 per 22 ounce jar, and \$20.00 per 32 ounce jar.

**NORTH & SOUTH DAKOTA:** No report issued.

**OHIO:** The state saw a diverse month of temperatures and precipitation variances with weeks of steady rainfall and cool temperatures. Record rainfall in the Southwest region and above normal precipitation was recorded in the Cleveland area. The extended cool and wet spring has allowed many of the early spring flowering weeds to bloom longer, such as purple deadnettle, mustard species and golden ragwort. Some areas of the state had a high number of swarms. Years that reported a high number of swarms usually resulted in more mite pressure as the season continued. Queen rearing has been difficult this spring for several reasons. The cool, wet weather impeded the foragers' ability to forage for pollen and nectar to feed the developing larvae. Most of the stored food had been consumed as the colony size increased. New queens have not successfully mated due to lack of healthy drones and available days favorable to fly and mate. Some have not been able to make it back to the colony due to rain, cold weather and predators. In general, swarms have occurred because the bees have been stuck in their colonies and unable to fly. The swarms have not always had results in well-mated, viable queens. Now that the spring nectar has ended and agricultural fields have been cut or killed of flowerings weeds, nectar sources many be equally difficult to access. Beekeepers are anxiously awaiting more consistent warm days in June to help their colonies succeed. In the Northwest, a warm and dry start, followed by a cold, wet mid-month, the dandelion bloom set up a big swarming season. There is some concern that the early hives that swarmed may have poor queens due to a poor mating season due to mid-month weather patterns. Currently, Russian Olive and Honeysuckle are in full bloom with Wild Cherry and White Dutch Clover just underway. In West Central district, record or near-record lows subdued normal nectar flows and pollen gathering. Hives have secured stores of nectar and pollen at alarmingly lower levels. At month's end, warmer temperatures spurred bee activity and allowed hives to rebound. Hopefully the weather will normalize and allow the weaker hives gain strength. In the Southeast, swarms were larger than normal. Pollen and nectar flows have been very good with some hives getting honey bound in the brood chambers. Queen cells are common, so weekly checks have been necessary to control swarming. Beekeepers have been adding honey supers above a queen excluder. Honey prices have remained stable at \$5.00-6.00 wholesale and \$8.00-10.00 retail per pound.

**OKLAHOMA:** No report issued.

**OREGON:** No report issued.

SOUTH CAROLINA: No report issued.

TENNESSEE: In Tennessee the nectar flow has been sporadic across the state due to excessive rainfall across the state. Sources of pollen and nectar were Tulip Poplar, bush honeysuckle, privet, clover and wildflowers. Beekeepers in TN have been dealing responsibly with the COVID-19 following the protocols set by the Governor.

TEXAS: No report issued.

WASHINGTON: No report issued.

WISCONSIN: Cloudy but about the same as last year. Unusually cool, although there was an earlier heat wave. More than normal precipitation coming in fewer events, with one extended dry period. New packages are doing very well and the first wave of new bees have emerged. Beekeepers report wild foliage for their bees that includes dandelions, creeping charlie, marsh marigolds, fruit trees (pears, apples), spring ephemerals, violets, deutzia, redbuds and crabapples. Demand for honey is good at the retail level and fairly good at the wholesale level. Prices are generally unchanged. Beekeepers are holding zoom meetings.
