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COLONY, HONEY PLANT AND MARKET CONDITIONS DURING MAY 2021

APPALACHIAN DISTRICT (MD, PA, VA, WV): The beautiful month of May brought plenty of activity among the colonies as bee numbers swelled with the very active brood rearing. Splits were being reported and swarms were being captured. Many novice beekeepers were looking to replace lost queens (to death or swarms) with local supplies. Colonies have lots of capped nectar and honey production is reported as very good. Black locust and tulip poplar trees, the latter which is a major nectar source in the District, had outstanding flow. Brambles, blueberries, and a plethora of wildflowers assisted in the pollen and nectar effort. The weather cooperated for the most part; however, the District again experienced a roller coaster of temperatures. Early May started off cool and damp, then overnight temperatures soured to the upper eighties. Following a short period of mostly normal temperatures (during peak bloom), the District dropped to cool with only isolated showers. Some areas did not receive the needed rainfall. The weather service

reported precipitation about 2" below normal for May. A rainy, cold weather pattern at the end of the month just about put an end to the tulip poplar flow. During this time the coldest day time highs for Memorial Day weekend (57 degree high at BWI airport) ever recorded. In addition to re-queening activities and adding supers, Beekeepers were also treating colonies for mites.

ALABAMA: In contrast to the previous month, much of the state experienced less precipitation than usual during May. Despite this, only northwestern regions experienced abnormally dry conditions. Beekeepers throughout the state added supers in anticipation of major spring nectar flows. In southern areas, Chinese tallow trees bloomed slightly earlier than usual, but plants in the northern parts of its range had not yet bloomed. Honeysuckles, privet, tulip poplar, clovers, and brambles were all in bloom, with beekeepers reporting overall good honey production. Many beekeepers voiced concern that continued lack of precipitation would reduce future nectar flows. Beekeepers continued to meet mostly electronically, with many clubs planning in-person meetings and field days over the next few months.

ARIZONA: Temperatures across Arizona were at above normal levels for the month of May. The main nectar and pollen sources for bees across the state were backyard and desert plant bloom, alfalfa, and melons – including cantaloupes, honeydews, watermelons and mixed melons. Wildflowers and desert plant bloom have been actively growing and abundant in the state, especially in the southern and central regions, which has greatly enhanced pollen sources for bees.

The Memorial Day holiday, as well as local farmers markets, have brought about an increased interest and sales of honey in Arizona.

Drought like conditions continue across the state. 99.00 percent of Arizona is now under drought conditions, with 86.52 percent of the state under extreme drought conditions. Demand for honey remained good across Arizona.

ARKANSAS: During the month of May temperatures were below normal across most of the state. Precipitation during May was mostly normal to slightly below normal across most of the state. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, Arkansas had normal soil moisture conditions for May. Too few prices exist to establish a current market price for wholesale white honey.

CALIFORNIA: "May was very cold, the coolest I have seen it in many years," a California beekeeper reported. "We continued to supplement feed the majority of our colonies, but there were a few locations where the bees actually made surplus honey from." "We have yet to pull this honey off, so I don't know what it will taste like. At this point, I really don't care as any wildflower mix sells well in our area," he continued. "The only floral sources I see are wild mustard and some buckwheat, but we are dry and don't expect much."

Some beekeepers had finished pollinating hybrid cauliflower and were starting to move into cucumber pollination and some sunflower pollination. These crops are late this year due to the cold weather. Bees that are near California buckeye are working that source "but will pay dearly as the brood will become deformed and the colony will dwindle and probably die as a result. We have moved all of our colonies away from it."

Beekeepers had seen increased demand for honey but with short supplies had to turn away some customers.

FLORIDA: The weather was drier than normal with about normal temperatures. Bee health was considered to be good as many producers had recently completed mite treatments. Treating for mites and hive splitting was essentially finished by late in the month. Sources of food included Chinese Tallow, titi and tupelo in North Florida early in the month. Gallberry, palmetto and some scattered wildflowers were available in many areas of the state. Near the end of the month supplemental feeding was necessary in most areas except where palmetto was still blooming. Tupelo honey production was probably about average but yield per hive was lower than expected. Many more hives were working tupelo than in a normal season. Yields last season were low and some honey producers were hoping that by placing more hives they could perhaps increase overall yields this year. Some bees were pollinating Florida crops including cucumbers and watermelons. Others were producing honey in various states including North and South Dakota. This honey was primarily clover with some wildflower honey also produced. Michigan, Maine and New York also had Florida bees pollinating various crops. Yields of Gallberry and palmetto honey were still being evaluated at the end of the month as beekeepers had not finished pulling honey from their hives. Some years large amounts of love bugs in Florida can adversely affect palmetto honey production. This does not seem to have happened this year.

GEORGIA: Beekeepers are busy selling honey locally now that the state is opened back up for business after the slow down caused by the pandemic. Local trade shows are being planned and in-person meetings are taking place again replacing the zoom and online meetings. Most are keeping an eye on the bees out in the melon and cotton fields. Some of the cotton fields do not look very good this year as was reported in the news as well as from beekeepers. Average losses of 20-50% were reported from earlier in the year. In some areas April was dry and some bees could not get enough food unless they had supplements available. Treatments are ongoing for large beekeepers to prevent extra losses prior to putting them out in the fields. Price out of the barrel \$5 lb for Tupelo.

IDAHO, COLORADO, UTAH: During the month of May temperatures were about normal across Eastern Idaho. Western Idaho had temperatures that were a little above normal for the month. Utah had temperatures that were higher than normal across most of the state. Colorado had temperatures that were lower than normal in the Eastern part of the state. The Western part saw temperatures that were normal for this time of year. Precipitation during May was normal for most of Idaho and Utah, Western Colorado saw precipitation that was a little lower than normal. Eastern Colorado saw precipitation that was above normal for May. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, Idaho had abnormally dry to severe drought soil conditions except for the Central area where a small area of extreme drought. Most of Utah is currently under extreme to exceptional drought conditions with more under exceptional drought. Colorado is all between severe drought and exceptional drought with a couple small patches of moderate drought in Northern Colorado.

Demand for Locally sourced honey has been good, and supply has been able to keep up. There were too few sales reported to establish a market for local honey.

ILLINOIS: Temperatures for the month of May were cool and very dry with a late warm up. It rained during the last weekend of the month. Beekeepers report that their bees are in good to excellent condition. Beekeepers also report the bees are feeding on wildflowers, such as Japanese honeysuckle and black locust. Demand for honey is good at the retail level and fairly good at wholesale level. Prices are generally unchanged.

INDIANA: Temperatures for the month of May were good overall. There was a good amount of rainfall early in the month and at the end of the month, as well. Beekeepers report that their bees continue to feed on wildflowers, such as White Dutch Clover and Black Locust. Beekeepers report their bees are in good condition. Demand for honey is good at the retail level and fairly good at the wholesale level. Prices are generally unchanged.

IOWA, KANSAS, MISSOURI, NEBRASKA: No report issued.

KENTUCKY: Kentucky had a chilly month in May, with Memorial Day weekend posting the lowest temperatures in its history of record keeping with highs getting to no higher than 60F on one day, struggling to reach 80F on the last day of the month. Perhaps no coincidentally, more chalkbrood and European foulbrood cases around the state have been reported. There have also been quite a few calls regarding especially cranky honeybees. Nonetheless, swarms were numerous throughout the state, with many beekeepers already harvesting honey. The Kentucky State Beekeepers Association is preparing for its booth at the Kentucky State Fair, trying to be mindful of CDC guidelines in the process for the safety of its volunteers. It is also preparing for the Eastern Apiculture Society conference to be held in Shepherdsville, KY, in August. This conference has reduced attendance this year, as per CDC guidelines. The Kentucky Queen Bee Breeders Association has held two queen bee grafting events in May, requiring vaccination cards at both events in order to ensure the safety and health of all participants.

LOUISIANA: During the month of May temperatures were below normal across most of the state. Precipitation was above normal to well above normal across the state. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, Louisiana had normal soil moisture conditions for May. Too few prices exist to establish a current market price for wholesale white honey.

MICHIGAN: May was very dry this year with lots of flight days. The nice weather with a few colder days created some swarming conditions with stronger hives confined to their hives on those days. Bees had good opportunities to forage and pollinate fruit trees and collect nectar on blooming plants and trees. Cold weather caused some frost damage to blooming fruit trees during these periods.

This month the bees foraged on Dandelion, Daffodil, Violets, Autumn olive, and the fruit trees Plum, Pear, Apple, Cherry, and Peach. Everything this spring has bloomed earlier than normal with the warmer temperatures we have had.

MINNESOTA: During the month of May, temperatures were normal across Northern Minnesota. Southern Minnesota had temperatures that were a little below normal for the month of May. Precipitation in May was above normal across the state. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, Minnesota had normal to moderate soil moisture conditions during the month of May.

Demand for Minnesota honey continues to be good for locally sourced honey. There were too few sales reported to establish a market for local honey.

MISSISSIPPI: Bees are feeding off of Chinese Tallow and Popcorn. Beekeepers are busy checking the bees to make sure treatments are working and feed is available. Current prices remain steady.

MONTANA: No report issued.

NEW ENGLAND: New England weather for the month of May has continued to be in drought style conditions and cool with unstable temperatures and a mixture of some mild to warm days sporadically placed along the month. This year's spring will soon be finishing up as we are about a week ahead of normal with the usual ornamental and floral sources for pollen and nectar such as pin cherry now blooming, henbit of the mint family provides red pollen, and sugar maples provide yellow pollen. Dandelions, from French dent-de-lion: lion's teeth is producing, with orange pollen and nectar. Later, there is box elder which is a huge pollen and nectar source, and black cherry is a green pollen source. Bell's honeysuckle *Lonicera x bella* (a cross between *L. tatarica* & *L. morrowii*) which provides delicious pollen and nectar. Black locust and blackberries, Multiflora rose is strictly for pollen, and Dutch clover follow. One example that I am aware of is of a local beekeeper that started collecting pollen 3 days ago and has been getting 4 lbs. of pollen a day.

New England beekeeping associations have been combining their Zoom meetings with opportunities to hear presentations from the best of the best in the science of beekeeping and in the format of colloquium style get-togethers.

Current retail price on natural honey is going for \$22 per quart. Pollen is \$30 per quart. Propolis is \$18 for 2 oz. Beeswax for brushing on plastic foundation is \$10/lb. and this makes comb building much better than the fine spray which is common.

NEW YORK: Below normal precipitation for May with moderate drought conditions in the North Country, Erie & Ontario lake shore, lower Hudson Valley, and western Long Island. Rain at the end of the month was insufficient. Beginning of the month it was very warm bringing an explosion of vegetative growth. Much cooler temperatures, including isolated frosts, came at the end of the month.

Beekeepers were supering hives with the main flow beginning midmonth for eastern NY with black locust bloom commencing. Later for central and western NY, black locust crop hit or miss with scattered, unpredictable rain.

Swarms were plentiful peaking statewide. Many beekeepers were splitting hives for increase. Some reports of bear movement going into apiaries. Upstate retail farm market/store honey sales were good. Price ranged from \$8.00 to \$18.00 for a 1-pound jar of wildflower honey. Large wholesale orders demand was good, but prices held down due to influx of cheaper imported honey.

NORTH CAROLINA: Temperatures in North Carolina were generally normal for May with a statewide average temperature of 65.9°F. Precipitation was below normal with 54 percent of North Carolina categorized in drought. Overall statewide soil moisture levels were rated 14 percent very short, 43 percent short, 42 percent adequate, and 1 percent surplus the week ending May 29. The North Carolina Drought Management Advisory Council reported 34 counties as being abnormally dry and 46 counties as experiencing moderate drought.

The late season frost/freeze that occurred on April 21 coupled with the drought conditions that developed in May had some reporting poor honey production in the southeastern region of the state. Otherwise, colony conditions were fairly good with only some virus issues reported. Bees could be seen working Sumac, Black Gum, Holly, Raspberry, and Tulip Poplar across the state. Dandelion, Black Locust, Persimmon, and Ladino White Clover were available in the Mountain and Piedmont regions. Also, available in the Piedmont region were Clovers (Aslike, Crimson, and Sweet), Vetch, and Privet. Huckleberry, Tupelo Gum, and Gallberry were blooming in the Coastal Plains region.

Some commercial pollinator hives moved up the East Coast to New Jersey, and later Maine, for blueberry and cranberry pollination. Others remained in North Carolina preparing to move bees to watermelon fields and other summer crops, however, the unseasonably dry weather has delayed production in many growing regions.

Retail honey prices at the Raleigh State Farmers' Market were generally unchanged: \$7.00-\$8.00 per 8 ounce jar, \$12.00-\$13.00 per 16 ounce jar, \$20.00-\$22.00 per 32 ounce jar, and \$18.00 per 44 ounce jar; processed honey, creamed, was \$10.00 per 16 ounce jar. Prices at the Piedmont Triad Farmers' Market in Greensboro were also unchanged at: \$8.00-\$12.00 per 8-ounce jar, \$12.00-\$18.00 per 22-ounce jar, and \$20.00 per 32-ounce jar.

NORTH & SOUTH DAKOTA: As bees began working their way back home conditions were generally very dry. Soil moisture while adequate in some areas, were short to very short in many. Overall planting progressed normally to ahead of schedule throughout the region with little or no precipitation to slow plantings. More moisture is need although long range forecasts looked for hot dry weather.

OHIO: May's temperatures fluctuated from cool to hot then cool and sunny. For example, in Cleveland on May 1, it was 31 degrees F, and 89 degrees May 25. On May 27 it dropped to 63 degrees. In Toledo, temperatures rose from freezing May 1 to 91 degrees May 21 and 25. In Southern Ohio it was 35 degrees May 1 then 88 degrees May 24. On May 29 it dropped back to 56 degrees.

Northeastern Ohio received heavy rainfalls early in the month with flash floods. On May 7, Erie County received 3.26" at 7:00 am. Hardin (SW of Lake Erie) and Richland County (South of Cleveland) received 2.84" and 2.72" that evening.

Northwest Ohio: The 1st half of May was cooler than normal and the last half warmer with several days in the 90's. Lots of trees and flowers blooming with lots of honey being made the last 2 weeks. Swarming is in high gear with lots of virgin queen swarms. Clover is starting to bloom along with the black locust.

West Central Ohio: Several days of rain created swarming of both managed and feral bees. In the past three weeks many sources of nectar and pollen were in bloom which has created honey bound brood areas in the colonies. Isolated area Feral swarms this year are large and plentiful. Feral swarms tested for varroa mites show very low mite populations, feral bees through natural selection are managing varroa to low populations.

Interestingly, the highly prized black locust held its flowers the last two weeks in north eastern, central and southern Ohio. Currently the sweetbay magnolia is starting to flower in the Cleveland Area and the American Holly and Multiflora rose are flowering in the Greater Cincinnati area. The Northern Catalpa is flowering in Central Ohio. Despite the varied temperatures, honeybees have been storing nectar to the point that many colonies are nectar bound. Copious numbers of swarms were reported when temperatures rose in Mid-May and continued the rest of the month, despite cooler days toward the end of the month. Honey prices remain stable \$5.00 to \$6.00 per pound wholesale and \$8.00 to \$10.00 per pound retail. With rising cost of containers, an increase in the retail price of honey is expected soon.

OKLAHOMA: During the month of May temperatures were below normal across most of the state. Precipitation during May was above normal across the state. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, normal to a few areas of abnormally dry soil conditions exist across the state. Too few prices exist to establish a current market price for wholesale white honey

OREGON: No report issued.

SOUTH CAROLINA: The upstate region of South Carolina reported that the nectar flow has peaked and is now beginning to decline. There was no need to feed established colonies, however new packages/nucs were fed to assist to strengthen the colonies. Colonies have consistent activity with good hive weight, making this a good time of the year to make splits to increase colony numbers with nectar flow still present. The current brood patters indicate that the intensive fall mite treatments were successful. The South Carolina State Farmers market located in West Columbia reported honey sales for 12-1 pint \$70.00, 12-1 quart \$130.00 and 12 count honey bears \$50.00-\$60.00.

TENNESSEE: Most of the State's beekeepers are reporting higher than average honey production so far this year. Clover, black locust, tulip poplar and wildflowers were the main nectar and pollen sources for May. With the easing of the Covid-19 restrictions more people are coming out to the Farmer's Markets helping the beekeepers sell their honey.

TEXAS: During the month of May temperatures were below normal across most of the state. Precipitation during May was above normal across the state except for far West Texas which was well below normal. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, soil moisture conditions for May were normal across most of the state again except for far West Texas which was exceptionally dry.

The wildflower bloom across much of Texas has been one of the best in recent memory. Bees buzzing and birds are singing. Too few prices exist to establish a current market price for wholesale white honey.

WASHINGTON: In May temperatures were mixed from warm to below normal, with a frost in a few locations. Overall, there was very little precipitation and much more precipitation was needed. Bloom for berries and some crops as well as wildflower bloom in the Cascades. With less moisture floral sources were not lasting as long as normal. Cherry development was advancing along with other soft fruit. All would benefit from additional rain.

WISCONSIN: Temperatures for the month of May were cool in the beginning and warmed substantially by the end. Most Beekeepers report a normal, healthy population of bees, while others say they are starting with a smaller population and are waiting for the bees to build up their numbers. Beekeepers report wild foliage for their bees includes Black Locust and other wildflowers. Demand for honey is good at the retail level and fairly good at the wholesale level. Prices are generally unchanged.
