## COLONY, HONEY PLANT AND MARKET CONDITIONS DURING JUNE 2021

APPALACHIAN DISTRICT (MD, PA, VA, WV): Summer arrived with June and colonies were very active gathering pollen and nectar. Brood rearing and honey production are reported to be good. An occasional beekeeper began extracting honey at the end of the month. Most do so in July. The temperatures were on a roller coaster up and down depending on the day, which is fairly normal for the District. Near the end of the month, temperatures were hotter than normal, and colonies were showing some bearding. The bloom started the month with tulip poplar, brambles and various wildflowers. Clover and more wildflowers captured the remainder of the month. A couple of beekeepers did report they had to re-queen colonies.

ALABAMA: No report issued.

ARIZONA: Temperatures across Arizona were at above normal levels for the month of June. The main nectar and pollen sources for bees across Arizona during the month of May were backyard and desert plant bloom, alfalfa, and melons – including cantaloupes, honeydews, watermelons, and mixed melons.

Drought like conditions continue across the state. 98.96 percent of Arizona is now under drought conditions, with 89.49 percent of the state under extreme drought conditions. Demand for honey remained good across Arizona.

ARKANSAS: During the month of June temperatures were slightly above normal across most of the state. Precipitation during June was above normal across most of the state. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, Arkansas had normal soil moisture conditions for June.

Too few prices exist to establish a current market price for wholesale white honey.

CALIFORNIA: Though some hives got plenty of nectar in June and others hardly any at all, California beekeepers agree that production of honey in June was unusually low. "From a personal perspective, this is the least honey my bees have produced to date since I started my own beekeeping business in 1978!" one beekeeper said. "We can sell all the honey we can produce but have only extracted about 15 percent of a normal crop," another added.

Some beekeepers moved their colonies late in the month to alfalfa and blooming cotton. Some placed colonies in vegetable seed and pumpkin pollination while continuing to feed them syrup. "So far, water for the bees has not been a problem," a beekeeper noted. "Things are beginning to wind down, with no bright outlook for the fall pasture. We are in an extreme drought, and fire conditions are getting worse."

Another had a more optimistic outlook. "Now that the weather has heated up considerably and the cotton is in full bloom, July is likely to be our best chance for honey production this year..." he said. Though some reported June as very dry with little nectar available, that wasn't the case for all. "We were all surprised by the amount of nectar that came in during June -- more than we expected," a beekeeper said. "Our colonies are in good condition for surviving the summer dearth."

Weather remained mostly normal, but there had been a few short hot spells. When weather permitted, beekeepers began to treat for Varroa mites.

FLORIDA: Rain and thunderstorms were numerous in most parts of Florida during the month. Coupled with about average warm temperatures, high humidity levels created high heat indices for most of the month. Bee health was considered to be about average. By the middle of the month most Chinese Tallow in the Panhandle and gallberry and palmetto across the state had finished blooming. After pulling the honey many beekeepers were treating for mites. Only scattered wildflowers were available for food in the latter part of the month with no commercial quantities of honey available for sale. Most hives required supplemental feeding. Demand for honey was considered very good as drought continued in many Western states cutting back on their normal honey production. Tupelo honey prices were probably slightly higher than last year. Some Florida bees were pollinating apples, cherries and plums in New York state and also producing some sweet clover honey. Other bees were producing clover honey in some of the Plains states including North and South Dakota. The next major source for honey production will be Brazilian Pepper which should begin blooming in early September.

GEORGIA: Beekeepers report that losses for the Spring are around 30-40 percent and some as high as 50 percent this year. While some beekeepers are now able to attend trade shows and festivals this summer to sell their locally produced honey, many are getting out of the hobby business and not replacing the losses. Rain along with problems with the varroa mite and hive beetles have kept beekeepers on their toes. Treatments are constant, but they have to stay on top of it or lose more bees. The Spring honey flow appears to be fairly good this year and the hives are coming out of the melon fields and heading toward the cotton. This pandemic has affected more than what meets the eye, with normal expenses along with rising costs of materials and products, many small bee hobbyists just cannot or do not want to look for a bright light at the end of this tunnel we have been in and have quit trying to produce honey. It is an expensive start up to get into, but there are a lot of items available to purchase on the cheap side if you know where to look for those wanting to get into beekeeping since many are selling their equipment and leaving the business. Some of the larger beekeepers will concentrate on producing honey and will not be selling Queens as they have in years past. Prices remain about steady, but sales are slow right now.

IDAHO, COLORADO, UTAH: During the month of June temperatures were above normal across Eastern Idaho. Western Idaho had temperatures that were above normal for the month. Utah had temperatures that were higher than normal across most of the state. Colorado had temperatures that were higher than normal across the whole state. Precipitation during June was lower than average for most of Idaho and Utah, Western Colorado saw precipitation that was lower than normal. Eastern Colorado saw precipitation that was about normal for June. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, Idaho had moderate drought to severe drought with a few areas of extreme drought soil conditions. Most of Utah is currently under extreme to exceptional drought conditions with more under exceptional drought. Colorado is all between Abnormally dry and extreme drought throughout the whole state.

Demand for Locally sourced honey has been great throughout all three states, some producers can't keep up with the demand. Prices for the month of June were between \$1.75 to \$1.95.

ILLINOIS: The weather in June was extremely dry and warmer than normal. There was less than 2" of rain for the month until June 24th, when some much-needed rain fell. Beekeepers report that most of their bees are in very good condition. Beekeepers also report the bees are feeding on wildflowers, such as, Basswood, black locust, Sweet Clover and White Dutch Clover. Honey production has started and is in good quantities. Demand for honey is very good at the retail level and good at wholesale level. Prices are generally unchanged.

INDIANA: Temperatures were abnormally high for the most part with a small cold spell in the middle of the month. There was very little rain except for the last week of the month. Beekeepers report that their bees continue to feed on wildflowers, such as Dutch Clover. Beekeepers also report that their bees are in mostly good condition. Only a small amount of honey flow was reported. Demand for honey is good at the retail level and fairly good at the wholesale level. Prices are generally unchanged.

IOWA, KANSAS, MISSOURI, NEBRASKA: No report issued.

KENTUCKY: No report issued.

**LOUISIANA:** During the month of June temperatures were slightly above normal across most of the state. Precipitation was slightly below normal across the state. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, Louisiana had normal soil moisture conditions for June.

Too few prices exist to establish a current market price for wholesale white honey.

**MICHIGAN:** June started dry and finished the month wet with rain in most places every day in the last week. Several areas posted more than 6 inches of rain one day. The main nectar flow started this month with good flows in the second and third weeks of the month. During this period there was little rain until late June when the rains came causing sporadic flows the last week.

The bees foraged on Dutch clover, Yellow sweet clover, Milkweed, Red clover, Sumac, Liden, Privet, wildflowers, and garden flowers this month. Some extraction has already started with some beekeepers from fruit bloom and early June honey. The rains will likely enable nectar to continue flowing through July with moisture in the ground.

Monitoring for the Varroa mites continues and treatments are being planned for hives above threshold mite populations.

While Honey stocks are dwindling honey is selling well in local markets this summer as covid 19 restrictions relax in Michigan.

**MINNESOTA:** During the month of June, temperatures were normal across Northern Minnesota. Southern Minnesota had temperatures that were a little above normal for the month of June. Precipitation in June was below normal across the whole state. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, Minnesota had abnormally dry to moderate dry soil moisture with a few small areas of severe drought soil conditions during the month of June. Supply for Minnesota honey continues to be good for locally sourced honey and producers are keeping up with the demand. There were too few sales reported to establish a market for local honey.

**MISSISSIPPI:** Reports that the Spring honey flow was pretty good and bees are foraging well after a wet month in June. Currently Red Vine, Sumac and White Dutch Clover along with some trees are available sources of food when the bees are out and about. No major losses reported over the Spring, just normal losses so far. Beekeepers are staying on top of treatments for the hives and the bees are in good shape for the summer months. Prices are steady and \$2.35 a pound out of the barrel is being quoted for sales.

**MONTANA:** No report issued.

**NEW ENGLAND:** In New England so far, the honey flow has been about average whereby the stronger hives have made some nice light Tatarian and Bell's honeysuckle, - a cross between *L. tatarica* & *L. morrowii*. Additionally, locust, blackberry, clover, and a bit of staghorn and sumac honey have recently been reported. Purportedly, basswood is full of buds. Staghorn sumac is starting to fade. Now is the time for linden, clovers, milkweed, alfalfa, smooth sumac, and purple looserstrife to help out the flow. Yellow sweet clover and white sweet clover are out, and the bees are loving it. The pollen flow has been excellent and is very tasty. Pollen weighs about 6 lbs. per gallon. In July, clover brown pollen is pervasive.

New England Beekeeping associations have taken advantage of the forced confinement and scourge of the COVID-19 pandemic by utilizing the IT meeting that zoom conferencing has created as many beekeepers throughout New England can all essentially be together in the "same room".

This month of June has shown the price figures of honey at mostly \$24 per quart, pollen showing \$30 per quart and propolis mostly at \$18 for 2 oz. Beeswax for brushing on plastic foundation is mostly \$10/lb.

**NEW YORK:** Abnormally dry conditions persist in western and north central New York; the North country experiencing moderate drought conditions. Higher than normal temperatures across the state may exacerbate lack of soil moisture with the below normal rain fall. Many beekeepers have already harvested an earlier than usual honey crop. Basswood blossom came through well with sumac and clover blooming, though the dry conditions are slowing the nectar run. Bear movement continues with some sightings outside their usual range.

**NORTH CAROLINA:** Temperatures in North Carolina were slightly below normal for June with a statewide average temperature of 73.6°F. Precipitation was technically above normal, however, that statement does not reflect the extremes experienced in the eastern part of the state, which received heavy rains (including Tropical Storm Claudette), versus the western part of the state, which had a very dry June. Overall statewide soil moisture levels were rated 1 percent very short, 14.5 percent short, 72.5 percent adequate, and 12 percent surplus the week ending June 26. The North Carolina Drought Management Advisory Council reported 51 counties as being abnormally dry and 6 counties as experiencing moderate drought.

Colonies were in generally good condition with minimal reports of pest or disease issues; however, European foulbrood was noted as being more common this spring. Apiary inspectors also noted issues with queens; queens suddenly missing, suddenly failing, or not making it back to the hive after mating, were reported more often than normal. Also reported for June was bear damage in southeastern North Carolina as the honey crop was bountiful in both southeastern and south-central North Carolina. The sourwood bloom in south-central North Carolina was especially good. Bees could also be seen working Sumac across the state. Dandelion; Raspberry; Tulip Poplar; and Basswood, Linden were available in the Mountain region. Persimmon and Clovers (Ladino, White and Sweet) were available throughout the Mountain and Piedmont regions. Also, available in the Piedmont region were Aslike Clover and Vetch; while Gallberry was blooming in the Coastal Plains region. Commercial pollinator hives in eastern North Carolina spent the month working cucurbits.

Demand for honey, especially local honey, was very good. Retail honey prices at the Raleigh State Farmers' Market were generally unchanged: \$7.00-\$8.00 per 8 ounce jar, \$12.00-\$13.00 per 16 ounce jar, \$20.00-\$22.00 per 32 ounce jar, and \$18.00 per 44 ounce jar; processed honey, creamed, was \$10.00 per 16 ounce jar. Prices at the Piedmont Triad Farmers' Market in Greensboro were also unchanged at: \$8.00-\$12.00 per 8-ounce jar, \$12.00-\$18.00 per 22-ounce jar, and \$20.00 per 32-ounce jar.

**NORTH & SOUTH DAKOTA:** As bees made their way home conditions were generally extremely dry. While adequate in a few areas, soil moisture was generally short to very short. Overall planting progressed normally to ahead of schedule throughout the region and by the end of the month sunflower plantings were nearly complete. Most areas had either completed first cuttings of alfalfa or were nearly done.

**OHIO:** - June was a good month for honeybees and arduous for beekeepers with extremely hot and humid conditions intermixed with heavy downfalls and a week of cold, rainy weather. Southwestern Ohio seemed to catch the brunt of the rain with Clinton and Darke County receiving over 4.5" June 18-

19, and a total of 7" for the Greater Cincinnati area! Even northern Ohio suffered heat and humidity with peaks of 92 degrees on June 29 in Cleveland Ohio and 93 degrees in Toledo. Conversely, Cleveland and Toledo dropped to 48 degrees and Cincinnati 51 degrees in the middle of the month.

Honeybees continued to enjoy a steady nectar flow with the Southern Catalpa and Northern Catalpa flowering in southern and Central Ohio and the Northern Catalpa blooming at the same time in the upper half of Ohio. Basswoods bloomed unabashed by the rainstorms while sweet and white clover continued to attract pollinators in most of Ohio. Milkweed and sumac is now beginning to flower in central Ohio with perennials and herbs blooming also. The OARDC phenological calendar shows that in the Cincinnati area, the Littleleaf linden is in first petal, while the panicled goldenrain tree and Rose-of-Sharon are showing color in Central Ohio. Cleveland is close behind with the Greenspire Littleleaf linden and Southern Catalpa in first bloom. Rose of Sharon is still a couple weeks away.

Northwest Ohio: After a very intense swarming season, swarming is slowing down, and the bees are starting to ramp up nectar collection. Lots of secondary swarms. The Memorial Day nectar lag has lasted longer than normal this year. Precipitation is about normal. Yellow sweet clover is nearing the end of the bloom with white sweet clover, milkweed, and linden trees in bloom.

West Central Ohio: Honeybee swarming was also intense in this area. Heavy nectar flows from Black Locust, Linden, Catalpa, Bass Wood, clover families, Bird's-foot trefoil has become a major flowering plant which produces both pollen and nectar for honeybees. Early soybeans are starting to bloom attracting honeybees for its nectar. Although beans don't require pollination, bees increase the yields ~15 percent. Farmers planted more beans than corn this year, the nectar flow will last for several weeks. It's been warm/hot, rain has been light until the last two days of the month with Thunderstorms.

OKLAHOMA: During the month of June temperatures were about normal across most of the state. Precipitation during June was above normal across the state. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, normal to a few areas of moderately dry soil conditions exist across the state. Too few prices exist to establish a current market price for wholesale white honey

OREGON: No report issued.

SOUTH CAROLINA: The upstate region of SC reported the brood productions continues to be high creating high colony populations. Hives are full of activity resulting from the honey flow. The 2-3 week drought resulted in bees being defensive/aggressive. Honey supers are full, capped, and ready for extraction.

The month of June had an average temperature of 78. A total of 5.95 inches of precipitation was noted. Nectar flow has peaked and is in rapid decline. Late May/Early June drought caused a sudden halt in nectar collection. However, at this time there is no need to feed established colonies.

Colonies have consistent activity with good hive weight. Colonies reported to have healthy, active, laying queens with good brood patterns.

The SC State Farmers Market located in West Columbia is selling at: 12/1 pint \$70.00, 12/1 quart \$130.00, 12 count honey bears \$50.00-60.00

TENNESSEE: No report issued.

TEXAS: During the month of June temperatures were about normal across most of the state. Precipitation during June was slightly below normal to below normal across most of the state. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, soil moisture conditions for June were normal across most of the state again except for far West Texas which was exceptionally dry.

Scattered showers across most of the state have kept the grass and wildflowers green through June. But as we start into July the heat is increasing and the showers are diminishing. Your average Texas weather conditions.

Too few prices exist to establish a current market price for wholesale white honey.

WASHINGTON: Berry bloom continued into June with above average temperatures. As strawberries began harvest other later berries bloomed. Wildflower bloom in the Cascades with less moisture floral sources was not lasting as long as normal. Although there was some isolated shower activity, primarily along the coast, record setting temperatures across the state took its toll on soil moisture, residual snow, and all non-irrigated crops. Even irrigated crops were showing stress and were susceptible to sunburn. Harvest was pushed forward on some crops. Extreme heat also led the way to an early onset of fire season.

WISCONSIN: The weather for the month was hot and dry with less than average rain fall. For the most part, beekeepers report a normal, healthy population of bees. Beekeepers report wild foliage for their bees includes Clematis, wisteria, raspberries, Elderberry, strawberry, currants, roses, peonies, asters, white clover, penstemon, spiderwort, tree lilac, tomatoes, eggplant, mustards, creeping thyme, and sedums.

Honey production has started. Demand for honey is good at the retail level and fairly good at the wholesale level. Prices are generally unchanged.
