COLONY, HONEY PLANT AND MARKET CONDITIONS DURING JULY 2021

APPALACHIAN DISTRICT (MD, PA, VA, WV): Hot and humid are the best words to describe this July. The month started with Beekeepers extracting honey and reporting pleasure with the spring honey flow. The sourwood bloom started in early July and was very good. Other nectar and pollen was supplied by thistles, Rudbeckia's, Monarda's, Liliuim's, daisies, clovers, rues, milkweeds, lavender and various other wildflowers with a reported very good bloom. The District started to enter it's dirth period where pollen and nectar become lighter in supply. Parts of Appalachia are very dry despite

occasional and scattered showers and thunderstorms. Beekeepers were applying insect control to colonies near the end of the month and prepping honey entries for county fairs. Temperatures were mixed between very hot and very humid days followed by short periods of cooler, less humid days and back to hot and humid.

ALABAMA: Most major nectar flows slowed by early July. As a result, beekeepers began harvesting their honey. Because Alabama continued to experience wet weather throughout the state, moisture content of honey was slightly higher than usual. To take advantage of the removal of honey supers and diminished brood production by colonies, beekeepers began to monitor and appropriately treat for the varroa mite. The wet weather may have caused some delays to these activities. Typical summer flowers, although limited compared to spring, bloomed. These included crepe myrtle, mimosa, hibiscus, and bottlebrush. Some beekeeper clubs met in person – either via their regular monthly meetings or during outdoor field days.

ARIZONA: No report issued.

ARKANSAS: During the month of July temperatures were about normal across most of the state. Precipitation during July was slightly above normal across most of the state. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, Arkansas had normal soil moisture conditions for July. Too few prices exist to establish a current market price for wholesale white honey.

CALIFORNIA: Persistently hot and dry weather in California resulted in higher prices for honey by late July. The drought could also reduce opportunities for beekeepers to rent hives for almond pollination this winter. Some almond orchards in areas with limited water supplies have been abandoned or removed. “Almond pollination will be a problem this coming year as many growers are having their water supplies cut back or eliminated,” a beekeeper said. “I foresee a surplus of bees and a desperate fight for pollination contracts and a corresponding rental price drop. My advice would be for out of state beekeepers to be sure they have iron-clad contracts before shipping their bees to California.”

Meanwhile, honey prices had increased to \$2.25-2.35 per pound and were expected to climb higher as supplies of new crop honey were well below normal due to the drought. “Some beekeepers have yet to extract any honey this season,” he said. “We are praying for a wet winter!”

Beekeepers reported shortages of nectar and pollen due to the drought. “We will have to ramp up the sugar syrup feeding as there are no available nectar sources,” a beekeeper said. “Water is becoming a problem as ponds and small streams have dried up” Feeding of protein patties could continue well into the fall. Beekeepers also risk losing hives in areas subject to wildfires.

Melons were among the commercial crops pollinated by hives in July. Hives have since been moved from summer vegetable pollination into fall and winter pastures. “In areas where cotton or alfalfa was blooming some nectar was collected and honey stored,” a beekeeper said. “Once melon pollination is over in late August or early September, there will be no additional commercial pollination jobs this year in the Central Valley area.”

FLORIDA: The weather was wet and warm, typical July conditions in Florida. Bee health was considered to be about average with a few beekeepers reporting large death losses caused by uncontrolled mites. There were practically no natural sources of nectar for the bees. Supplemental feeding was necessary for any in-state bees. Some bees were still located in some of the Plains state making clover honey. Most pollination duties had ended in the Northeastern states. There were some bees left in states such as Michigan, Wisconsin and New York producing clover honey. There was essentially no honey produced in Florida for commercial use. The next source of nectar and honey production will be Brazilian Pepper. It is expected to begin blooming on the western side of the state sometime between early September and the middle of the month.

GEORGIA: July was a rather hot and wet rainy month. Beekeepers are hoping that it does not affect the Fall honey flow. Most report around a 30 percent loss when checking the hives after the Spring flow and bringing in the hives from the melon fields. In some areas the heat was not as bad, but they still reported losses with the same percentages. Many small hobby apiarists are not replacing their bees and are just quitting the bee business as the cost for pretty much everything is getting too expensive to continue on a small scale, especially with the extra costs of lumber alone. The Goldenrod is coming in and cotton fields look good so far this year as long as there are not any threats from hurricanes and inclement weather it should be a nice Fall crop. Sales are slow. Wildflower \$2.00 lb Wholesale, \$6.00 lb retail

IDAHO, COLORADO, UTAH: During the month of July temperatures were above normal across all Western and Eastern Idaho. Utah had temperatures that were a little higher than normal across most of the state. Colorado had temperatures that were higher than normal across the Western side of the state. Temperatures were a little higher than normal for the Eastern side of the state. Precipitation during July was higher than average for Utah, Precipitation for Eastern Idaho was very low for July, Western Idaho saw a little higher than average precipitation. Western Colorado saw precipitation that was about normal. Eastern Colorado saw precipitation that was a lot lower than normal for July. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, Idaho had Severe drought to exceptional drought with a few areas of moderate drought soil conditions. Utah is currently under extreme to exceptional drought conditions with more under exceptional drought. The whole Western side of the state of Colorado is between Severe dry to exceptional drought, the Eastern side of the state is between no drought and abnormally dry with mostly no drought.

Demand for locally sourced honey has been great throughout all three states, some producers in Idaho and Utah have started extracting honey due to the drought, most of them are predicting a smaller than average honey crop. Others say it will be an average year for honey. Most producers can't keep up with the demand for local honey while other producers have good supply of honey.

Prices for the month of July were between \$1.80 and \$2.50 per pound with a mostly price of \$1.80-\$1.95 for Idaho, Colorado prices are \$1.75-\$1.90 per pound for local honey. Too few sales reported for the state of Utah to establish a market,

ILLINOIS: This month, early rains helped kick-start the blooming of many pollinator plants. The month is ending in a dry spell with intense heat. Precipitation was very spotty with some areas having over 5" and some areas having none. Beekeepers report no real problem with insects. The bees are in excellent condition and honey harvesting has begun. The bees are feeding on white sweet clover, white Dutch clover, bee balm, milkweed, purple corn flower, swamp milkweed, butterfly bush, butterfly weed, soybean and sunflower. If the dryness continues, there will be little or no honey flow from goldenrod or New England asters. Therefore, the honey stocked in the beehives will be short and fall feeding will have to follow. The demand for honey was moderate and there are no change in prices for honey.

INDIANA: Temperatures for the month of July were within the seasonal averages. There was a lot more rain than usual. Beekeepers report that their bees continue to feed on wildflowers, such as clover and alfalfa. The bees are said to be in fair to good condition. Beekeepers report a decent amount of honey flow. Demand for honey is good at the retail level and fairly good at the wholesale level. Prices are generally unchanged.

IOWA, KANSAS, MISSOURI, NEBRASKA: No report issued.

KENTUCKY: The Kentucky beekeeping industry enjoyed a bountiful honey harvest in July. Temperatures were notably cooler, and timely rain extended clover and wildflower blooms. After harvesting honey, beekeepers started treating for varroa mites, taking advantage of the cooler temperatures. Other hive issues have included nosema, European foulbrood, and parasitic mite syndrome. Kentucky has 54 beekeeping associations, but these associations have not all been able to start meeting again on a regular basis. Prior to Covid-19, many associations met at local cooperative extension offices, which adhere to the University of Kentucky guidelines. During July, some associations tried to provide mentorship by hosting field days. The month ended with preparations to host the Eastern Apiculture Society, an important regional conference, in Shepherdsville. Last year's EAS conference was cancelled due to Covid-19 virus, so this year's conference is only three days (normally it is five days), limited attendance (300 pre-registered attendees), and no walk-ins.

LOUISIANA: During the month of July temperatures were about normal across most of the state. Precipitation was above normal across the state. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, Louisiana had normal soil moisture conditions for July. Too few prices exist to establish a current market price for wholesale white honey.

MICHIGAN: July was warm with plenty of rain which dampened the outlook for a great honey crop. Beekeepers are reporting diminished honey flows caused by heavy rains this month. Bees are in good health, but July swarms and splits slowed development for late starts. Varroa mite monitoring and treatments continue this month as mite numbers begin to peak in untreated hives.

This month bees were foraging on White sweet clover, Dutch clover, Alfalfa, Soybeans, herbs, and wildflowers.

MINNESOTA: During the month of July temperatures were slightly higher across the whole state of Minnesota. Precipitation in July was extremely below normal in Southern Minnesota and a little below average for Northern Minnesota. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, Minnesota had Moderate dry to extreme dry soil moisture throughout the whole state for July.

Supply for Minnesota honey continues to be good for locally sourced honey and producers are keeping up with the demand. Prices per pound for Minnesota were \$1.80-\$2.27 for locally sourced honey for the month of July.

MISSISSIPPI: Beekeepers report a decent crop from the Spring flow, but there was a lot of rain that hindered it from being a good one. The bees are in good shape, and are being treated regularly and waiting for the Goldenrod to come in. Sales are doing okay but could be better. Wildflower \$2.30-2.40 lb

MONTANA: No report issued.

NEW ENGLAND: In New England so far, the honey flow has been about average whereby the stronger hives have made some nice light Tatarian and Bell's honeysuckle, - a cross between *L. tatarica* & *L. morrowii*. Additionally, locust, blackberry, clover, and a bit of staghorn and sumac honey have recently been reported. Purportedly, basswood is full of buds. Staghorn sumac is starting to fade. Now is the time for linden, clovers, milkweed, alfalfa, smooth sumac, and purple loosestrife to help out the flow. Yellow sweet clover and white sweet clover are out, and the bees are loving it. The pollen flow has been excellent and is very tasty. Pollen weighs about 6 lbs. per gallon. In July, clover brown pollen is pervasive.

New England Beekeeping associations have taken advantage of the forced confinement and scourge of the COVID-19 pandemic by utilizing the IT meeting that zoom conferencing has created as many beekeepers throughout New England can all essentially be together in the "same room". This month's zoom conference calls have involved Dr. Samuel Ramsey and Jane Sloboda.

This month of June has shown the price figures of honey at mostly \$24 per quart, pollen showing \$30 per quart and propolis mostly at \$18 for 2 oz. Beeswax for brushing on plastic foundation is mostly \$10/lb.

NEW YORK: Hot, dry conditions changed to more humid, rainy weather, and by the end of July cooler temperatures, with only the 3 northern counties bordering Canada experiencing abnormally dry weather; though long-term stress on vegetation may impact the northern counties as well as the southwest NY, lower Hudson, and Long Island areas. The early summer flow yielded a great early crop, with some hives backfilling brood nests. By the end of July the usual nectar dearth has slowed down the hectic nectar flow which giving beekeepers time to inspect and treat for varroa, as varroa mite infestation numbers are on the increase. Early isolated sightings of goldenrod blossoms, a preview of the full bloom to occur in several weeks.

NORTH CAROLINA: Temperatures in North Carolina were once again slightly below normal in July with a statewide average temperature of 76.8°F. Precipitation ended up being about normal after Tropical Storm Elsa crossed the state on July 08, 2021. Overall statewide soil moisture levels were rated 2 percent very short, 25.5 percent short, 69 percent adequate, and

3.5 percent surplus the week ending July 31. The North Carolina Drought Management Advisory Council reported 24 counties as being abnormally dry.

In both the southeastern Coastal Plains and the southern Piedmont, apiary inspectors noted increased pest pressures and diminished food stores, with some reporting that a few colonies had already succumbed to death from starvation in late July. As nectar availability declined many beekeepers had to begin providing supplemental feed to their bees, even those that seemed to have sufficient stores just weeks prior.

Where available, bees could be seen working Basswood, Linden, and Sourwood in the Mountain region. Various clovers (Ladino, White, and Sweet) were available throughout the Mountain and Piedmont regions. Also, available in the Piedmont region was Alsike Clover and Heartsease, Smartweed. Sumac was available across the State.

Commercial pollinator hives in North Carolina spent the month working cucurbits, including cucumbers, pumpkins, squash, and watermelon. Replacement beekeepers began preparing colonies for next spring's sales by making splits and raising or buying queens; current supply and demand for bees was seasonally light. Beekeepers that keep bees for honey production were still in the midst of a nectar flow.

Demand for honey, especially local honey, was very good; supplies were moderate. Retail honey prices at the Raleigh State Farmers' Market were generally unchanged: \$7.00-\$8.00 per 8-ounce jar, \$12.00-\$13.00 per 16-ounce jar, \$20.00-\$22.00 per 32-ounce jar, and \$18.00 per 44-ounce jar; processed honey, creamed, was \$10.00 per 16-ounce jar. Prices at the Piedmont Triad Farmers' Market in Greensboro were also unchanged at: \$8.00-\$12.00 per 8-ounce jar, \$12.00-\$18.00 per 22-ounce jar, and \$20.00 per 32-ounce jar.

NORTH & SOUTH DAKOTA: Conditions continue to run behind average. Water and soil moisture continue to run below normal limiting or delaying some floral sources. Potatoes were in full bloom. Sunflowers were emerging early in the month with the bloom advancing in late July. Alfalfa was into the 2nd cutting.

OHIO: HOT! Is the word for July in Ohio, as high heat (high 80's – 90's degrees) and humidity festered throughout Ohio, along with some strong storms. Surprisingly some late honeybee swarms were caught, some swarms left their "housing" several weeks after being collected, while other colonies absconded.

Ohio experienced significant rainfalls in July with Warren County (SW Ohio) receiving 5.5" and Delaware (Central), Cuyahoga (Lake Erie region), Crawford County (N Central) and Huron County (Lake Erie region) all receiving over 4 inches. As of midnight July 25, Cleveland set a new record as the fourth wettest July in history with 7.62" of rain.

With most of the summer flowering plants finished, honeybees have been visiting soybean fields, hay that hasn't been cut and seed crops (clover, onion, carrot, etc.) as well as white and sweet clover. Pollen and nectar continue to be brought in and for most of Ohio, the "summer dearth" has been minimal to non-existent. Honey yields should be good in many areas of Ohio, but it varies even from one side of a main road to another as the rain showers have been spotty but intense. Varroa mite treatments are being applied as high populations are expected this fall.

Southeast Ohio: Summer's heat is here, and the bees are still doing great. This area has continued to get rain when we needed it and the grass has not turned brown as it does most years. The honey flow from soybeans is about finished and the hives are full with many beekeepers reporting that they are out of equipment and have to extract honey to make more room for the bees. Still seeing lots of drones and queen rearing is continuing nicely. Some late swarms are being reported in many areas.

Northwest Ohio: Too much rain in July. Nectar is not being collected and what is collected is drying very slowly. Slightly cooler than normal temperatures. Soybeans are starting to bloom, and clover continues to bloom. Honey prices remain stable \$5.00 to \$6.00 per pound wholesale and \$8.00 to \$10.00 per pound retail.

West Central Ohio: Area has been very warm during July with normal rainfall. Heavy nectar and pollen flows are continuing from clovers, soybean, and miscellaneous flowers. Soybeans have become a major source of nectar in areas of row crop farming in Ohio. This year Ohio farmers planted 20% more beans than in the past due to the price of beans. Also, pollinators including honeybees increase the yield of beans by as much as 20%. Beans will be blooming into late September this year.

OKLAHOMA: During the month of July temperatures were below normal across most of the state. Precipitation during July was below normal across the state. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, normal to a small area of abnormally dry soil conditions exist across the state. Too few prices exist to establish a current market price for wholesale white honey

OREGON: No report issued.

SOUTH CAROLINA: No report issued.

TENNESSEE: Honey production in Tennessee looks like it is going to be better than average this year. Beekeepers in some areas of the state are reporting over twice the average harvest. Sourwood and sumac nectar flows were strong across the region. Beekeepers are reporting lower than average small hive beetle issues this year. Beekeepers are reporting that honey sales have rebounded this year following the easing of covid-19 restrictions.

TEXAS: During the month of July temperatures were below normal across most of East Texas. Temperatures in West Texas were about normal. Precipitation during July was slightly below normal across the Eastern part of the state. In an interesting turn of events, West Texas had above average rainfall for the month. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, soil moisture conditions for July were normal across most of the state including far West Texas.

The wildflower bloom across much of Texas has continued through July. This summer been one of the best in recent memory. Central Texas pastures remain green and that is a very unusual event. The bees are still buzzing, and birds are still singing.

Too few prices exist to establish a current market price for wholesale white honey.

WASHINGTON: Early summer high temperatures backed off but continued above normal in July. The drought and high temperatures took its toll on many crops including raspberries and blueberries. Peach and nectarine harvest began along with sweet corn while a number of acres of scrubland burned with wildfires. High temperatures and drought conditions limited many wildflowers floral sources and made for extreme fire conditions in the back country areas.

WISCONSIN: Temperatures for the month of July were high. There was a lot of rain for this time of year. There has been no problem with insects. Generally, bees are in fair to good condition. Little foliage remains for the bees. Honey production was good for some and harvesting has begun. Demand for honey is good at the retail level and fairly good at the wholesale level. Prices are generally unchanged.
