## COLONY, HONEY PLANT AND MARKET CONDITIONS DURING JUNE 2022

**APPALACHIAN DISTRICT (MD, PA, VA, WV):** Colonies continue to be very active and producing honey. Colonies continue to bring in pollen and nectar from an abundance of local wildflower flora mostly white clover. Temperatures have been near normal with the average amount of warm days divided by cooler days. There are reports of bearding on the warmer than average days. The area was becoming drier than normal, but precipitation at the end of the month helped alleviate the dry conditions. Beekeepers are reporting good brood production. Honey production has been good as some beekeepers have pulled supers for collection. An occasional beekeeper is requesting a new queen due to a failed queen. Honey prices for cartons 12 1-pound containers at the wholesale market in Jessup, MD are \$85.00 for wildflower and clover honey.

**ALABAMA:** Despite above average temperatures but below average precipitation, beekeepers reported good nectar flows. Chinese tallow flowered for several weeks throughout the state. Forbs such as black-eyed Susan, purple coneflower, butterfly milkweed, and coreopsis were available, as were crape myrtles, bottle brush trees, and brambles. Beekeepers in southern areas began to harvest their honey; however, most anticipate a July harvest, followed by mite management. Many beekeeping clubs met in person and are planning their summer events.

**ARIZONA:** Drought and high temperatures persisted into June for Arizona, affecting forage growth, pasture conditions, and range conditions. Forest fires also began in the northeastern part of the state.

Some bee colonies saw relief as the monsoon season got under way. Monsoon rains positively affected southcentral Arizona, improving forage growth there. Toward the end of the month, scattered rains were reported in the southeastern part of the state, where over two inches of precipitation has helped to improve soil moisture and forage growth.

Across Arizona, pasture and range conditions were rated mostly poor to very poor. Most of the state's cotton crop has been squared and most wheat crops and alfalfa have been harvested.

**ARKANSAS:** During the month of June temperatures were below normal across most of the state. Precipitation during June was above normal across most of the state. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, Arkansas had mostly normal soil moisture for May.

Commercial beekeepers are reporting that their bees are looking healthy. According to beekeepers, there have been only minimal colony losses this year. Varroa mites seem to be under control.

Few prices exist to establish a current market price for wholesale white honey. Beekeepers are seeing a spike in prices caused by increased retail sales due to the Corona virus pandemic. Pricing for single load and immediate delivered honey has jumped to \$1.80-\$1.90 with a few loads at \$2.00 as packers try to meet the retail demand. No one knows how long this will last but at this point most beekeepers are happy to get it.

**CALIFORNIA:** A stressful spring and persistent dry weather continued to limit honey flow from California bees through June. "Most hives are still trying to catch up from the poor spring (no honey flows, insufficient pollen) due to the drought," a beekeeper said. "I know of no beekeepers in our area that have extracted any honey to date." "Due to the stressful spring, our colonies entered our honey flow at about half normal strength," another beekeeper noted. "They were able to build up during the flow, but not to full strength, with a small crop."

"Our major flow of wildflower, coffeeberry, blackberry, and toyon is over, and we're waiting to see whether yellow star thistle will produce or not. We got some surprise June rain, but it's been extremely hot and dry since then."

Some hives in the Central Valley were moved into melon and alfalfa seed pollination. Nectar was also collected from blooming alfalfa. In late June, cotton also began producing nectar. "Pollen supplies are still scarce, and many hives were fed protein supplements in June in order to help the hives maintain a healthy brood nest," a beekeeper said. Other beekeepers had plenty of pollen available but had begun feeding sugar syrup.

Colonies were also treated for varroa mites. Some colonies were moved into summer vegetable seed pollination, though that usually fails to produce honey. "The bees are in good shape," a beekeeper said. "The new queens this year appear to be of better quality than last year with a lot fewer drone layers. It is going to be a long, long summer as there will be no forage for the bees after the pollination is done.

"The honey market is strong, but there is a lack of quality honey available."

**FLORIDA:** Temperatures were about normal for the month with high humidity and about normal precipitation in most of the state. The southern portion, particularly on the western side of the state, received more rain and thunderstorms than most other areas. This led to some hives being flooded. Loss estimates are not currently available. Bee health was considered to be good overall with some shippers splitting hives, supplemental feeding and increasing hive numbers. Many bees remained in the Dakotas producing honey. Some were still in the Northeast pollinating primarily cranberries. Gallberry nectar flow was described as good by many producers. Honey production was almost all gallberry during most of the month. There were few other sources of nutrition for the bees other than wildflowers. Cabbage palm will be the next major source of nectar in Florida followed by Brazilian Pepper. Many beekeepers will be treating for mites in July between these two nectar flows. Demand was good for stored supplies of gallberry honey.

**GEORGIA:** The Sourwood honey crop is expected to be about average. Some areas have a nice volume, while others are about fifty percent of expectations due to rain. In the southern areas of the state the hives are coming off the melon fields and are preparing to head into the cotton fields. No supplemental feeding needed at this time as bees are still bringing in pollen and building up honey for later. Many beekeepers are treating for mites and hive beetles, and some bees appear to be a little light in weight although they seem to be in good condition health wise. The Spring flow was considered to be average this year. Demand is fairly good and beekeepers are attending meetings and shows in person again.

**IDAHO, COLORADO, UTAH:** During the month of June temperatures were normal across all Western and Eastern Idaho. Utah had temperatures that were slightly above normal across the entire state. Colorado had temperatures that were normal across the entire state. Precipitation during June was below average for Utah. Precipitation was just above average for western Idaho, eastern Idaho saw a little below average precipitation. Western Colorado saw precipitation that was a little below normal. Eastern Colorado saw precipitation that was far below normal for June.

According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, in June Idaho had no dry soil in the panhandle and moderate to severe drought in the rest of the state. Utah is currently under extreme to exceptional drought conditions with most of the state under extreme dry soil conditions. The whole state of Colorado is between abnormally dry soil to severe drought with a couple patches of extreme dry soil and a small patch of no dry soil on the north end of the state.

Demand for Locally sourced honey has been good throughout all three states. Producers are keeping up with the demand for local honey in all three states. Most producers are saying the crop is behind schedule so far because of this bad spring weather and late bloom.

Prices for the month of June were between \$2.35 and \$3.50 per pound with a mostly price of \$2.40-\$3.00 for Idaho, Colorado prices are \$2.30-\$2.70 per pound for local honey. Prices for locally sourced honey in Utah are \$2.50-\$3.00 per pound with mostly \$2.27-\$2.36.

ILLINOIS: Temperatures for the month of June were higher than average. There was a below average amount of rain. Beekeepers report that most of their bees are in good condition. Beekeepers also report the bees are feeding on wildflowers, such as Sweet Clover and White Dutch Clover. Production has started. Early production has been disappointing, but beekeepers are hopeful for increased production later this summer. Demand for honey is good at the retail level and slow at wholesale level. Prices are generally unchanged.

INDIANA: The weather in June has been hot with very little rainfall. Beekeepers report that their bees continue to feed on wildflowers, such as Dutch Clover. Beekeepers report that their bees are in mostly good condition. Beekeepers report a small amount of honey flow. Demand for honey is good at the retail level and fairly good at the wholesale level. Prices are generally unchanged.

IOWA, KANSAS, MISSOURI, NEBRASKA: No report issued.

KENTUCKY: As the weather patterns began to stabilize, the predictable problems that plague Kentucky beekeepers began to appear in June: European foulbrood, Bee Parasitic Mite Syndrome, and Chalkbrood were seen. When samples were taken at some apiaries, the numbers were getting high, a little higher than threshold (4 varroa mites per 100 bees). Unfortunately, a heat wave coupled with dry weather settled in for the last two weeks of June, so beekeepers had few options to treat for varroa mites.

With Covid cases increasing in Kentucky this summer, beekeepers have been increasingly exposed to the virus and its multiple variants. Gas is well over 4.50 a gallon, and prices for most honey production supplies have increased (i.e., bottles, labels, etc.). Nonetheless, new "local" beekeeping associations are forming every month and enthusiasm for beekeeping remains strong.

LOUISIANA: During the month of June temperatures were normal to slightly above normal across most of the state. Precipitation during June was normal to above normal. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, Louisiana had mostly normal soil moisture for June.

Commercial beekeepers are reporting that their bees are looking healthy. According to beekeepers, there have been only minimal colony losses this year. Varroa mites seem to be under control.

Few prices exist to establish a current market price for wholesale white honey. Beekeepers are seeing a spike in prices caused by increased retail sales due to the Corona virus pandemic. Pricing for single load and immediate delivered honey has jumped to \$1.80-\$1.90 with a few loads at \$2.00 as packers try to meet the retail demand. No one knows how long this will last but at this point most beekeepers are happy to get it.

MICHIGAN: This month was quite warm, reaching 90 or more eight times during the month. Luckily it was rainy earlier this spring because there was very little rain fall in June in the mid-Michigan area. This weather has created conditions for a nice nectar flow this month. If this dry weather continues it could shorten the honey flow later.

As is the practice during the summer beekeepers are monitoring for Varroa mites and enacting treatment plans to control the mite populations. This in turn helps to keep the virus load down in the hive of bees vectored by the Varroa mite.

The main honey plants the bees have foraged on this month were the Basswood, Yellow sweet clover, White sweet clover, Dutch clover, Crimson clover, Milkweed, Watermelon, Squash, Oregano, Blackberry, Raspberry, Nettles, and many other herbs and weeds.

Honey extracting has just started for many beekeepers as honey supplies have run low or out completely. Beekeepers are still monitoring equipment and supply costs as they adjust pricing to adjust for inflationary increases.

MINNESOTA: During the month of June temperatures were normal across the entire state. Precipitation in June was average for the North end of the state and precipitation was far below normal for the south end of the state of Minnesota.

According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, in June the entire north end of the state of Minnesota had no dry soil and the south end of the state is mostly abnormally dry soil with small parts of no dry soil.

Producers are keeping up with the demand for local honey. Most producers are saying the crop is behind schedule so far because of this bad spring weather and late bloom.

Prices per pound in Minnesota were \$2.25-\$5.00 with mostly price of \$2.80-\$3.75 for locally sourced honey for the month of June.

MISSISSIPPI: Volume of honey is considered average this year. More clover honey was produced than in other years, possibly due to plenty of rain. The honey is reported to be lighter in color but quality is good. The bees are reported to be in good condition heading into the hot summer months. Beekeepers are still maintaining treatments to prevent losses from hive beetles and mites.

MONTANA: No report issued.

NEW ENGLAND: No report issued.

NEW YORK: Good nectar flows of black locust tree, sumac, milkweed, clover, with many beekeepers reporting excellent honey crops. Swarm season remains active but slowing down in some regions, while still in full swing in the North Country. Colonies building up nicely. The soil is beginning to dry, while areas in central/western NY and the Albany region have abnormally dry conditions.

Honey demand remains high with good prices, with some beekeepers anticipating replenishing their 2021 stock with honey harvesting in July.

NORTH CAROLINA: Temperatures in North Carolina were above normal in June with a statewide average temperature of 75.2°F; precipitation was below normal, ranking 2nd driest since 1895. Overall statewide soil moisture levels were rated 19 percent very short, 45 percent short, 35.5 percent adequate, and 0.5 percent surplus the week ending July 02. The North Carolina Drought Management Advisory Council reported 57 counties as being abnormally dry, 26 counties as experiencing moderate drought conditions, and 16 counties as experiencing severe drought conditions.

The persistent dry weather in the Coastal Plains region left mixed reviews regarding honey production, while the Mountain region continued to experience excellent yields. Bees could be seen working Sumac across the state. Dandelion; Raspberry; Tulip Poplar; and Basswood, Linden were available in the Mountain region. Persimmon and Clovers (Ladino, White and Sweet) were available throughout the Mountain and Piedmont regions. Also, available in the Piedmont region were Aslike Clover and Vetch; while Gallberry was blooming in the Coastal Plains region. Commercial pollinator hives in eastern North Carolina spent the month working cucurbits.

A busy swarm season in April and May left beekeepers to discover queen-less hives in June. Colony loss from increased mite pressures was also reported to apiary inspectors. On a positive note, European foulbrood was noted as being less prevalent than normal for the time of year.

Retail honey prices at the Raleigh State Farmers' Market were generally unchanged: \$7.00-\$8.00 per 8-ounce jar, \$12.00-\$13.00 per 16-ounce jar, \$20.00-\$22.00 per 32-ounce jar, and \$18.00 per 44-ounce jar; processed honey, creamed, was \$10.00 per 16-ounce jar. Prices at the Piedmont Triad Farmers' Market in Greensboro were also unchanged at: \$8.00-\$12.00 per 8-ounce jar, \$12.00-\$18.00 per 22-ounce jar, and \$20.00 per 32-ounce jar.

**NORTH & SOUTH DAKOTA:** Topsoil and subsoil moisture were generally adequate all around. Cooler, wet spring weather has resulted in planting delay. This was followed by delays in emergence. Alfalfa quality was generally good and first cuttings were starting around mid-June. Overwintered crops were aided by warming weather and good soil moisture.

**OHIO:** Northwest Ohio: June has been a good month for bees. Normal rainfall and most of it was late afternoon or evenings and above normal temperatures with lots of bright sunshine. Getting a bit dry now. Honey is usually slow the first half of the month and that is being reported again this year. Basswoods are starting to bloom along with clovers. Honey prices are \$5.50 to \$6.50 per pound wholesale and \$8.50 to \$10.50 per pound retail.

West Central Ohio: Rain fall was above average in early June, below average in late June. Temperature was above normal. Because of the high rain and temperatures, our area had above average nectar and pollen flows from many sources, we had a heavy honey flow. The colonies required above average management to prevent the brood nests from becoming honey bound. Our work with the feral honeybee swarm trapping has been extremely successful. Our team has caught ~300 swarms in about 35 Ohio counties. We are working with Purdue University doing dna tests on the swarms, looking for above average quality genetics and also Africanized honey bee genetics. A long-term honeybee breeding project is in the works.

Beekeepers experienced a good nectar flow between rainfall and temperature extremes through most of June, in fact it was the decisive month as to which colonies would grow and be productive. Colonies in areas with wildflowers and diverse plantings reported three or four supers packed with honey per colony. Other areas were not as successful. Farmers were finally able to finish planting soybeans which will provide a boost for honeybees later this season.

Weather varied between cool and rainy to windy and extremely hot! For instance, in the Toledo area on June 4, temperatures dropped to 49 F and stayed cool for three weeks, then rose to 90 and 100 degrees June 20-21. In Mansfield (south of Cleveland), cool temperatures early in the month progressed to a week of 90s then cooled again the remainder of the month. Dayton experienced cool temperatures until the fourth week when it peaked at 95 degrees F and remained in the nineties the rest of the month.

Severe storms wracked Ohio two weeks in a row- in the evening of June 8, six tornados hit western Ohio including Champagne, Darke, Miami, Clark, Brown and Hocking County, damaging homes and buildings and farm equipment. On June 13, three tornadoes were reported in four counties- first Pike County, then in Northern Ohio, Morrow, Knox, Richland and Ashland County reaching wind speeds of 105 mph. These storms resulted in uprooted and broken trees, structure damage and lost power for four days. Although not directly related to honeybee health, it demonstrates the struggles that honeybee colonies and beekeepers had this month.

Phonologically, most of the major nectar sources have finished with golden rain tree and Rose of Sharon finishing the flow. Dry hot weather is predicted for July and August. Beekeepers need to monitor colonies for varroa mites and to ensure that the colonies have room for the queen to continue laying eggs.

**OKLAHOMA:** During the month of June temperatures were normal across most of the state. Precipitation during June was below normal across most of the state. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, Southeast Oklahoma had normal soil moisture for June. The rest of the state shows abnormally dry to extreme drought conditions for the month.

Commercial beekeepers are reporting that their bees are looking healthy. According to beekeepers, there have been only minimal colony losses this year. Varroa mites seem to be under control.

Few prices exist to establish a current market price for wholesale white honey. Beekeepers report a spike in prices caused by increased retail sales due to the Corona virus pandemic. No one knows how long this will last but at this point most beekeepers are happy to get it.

**OREGON:** No report issued.

**SOUTH CAROLINA:** No report issued.

**TENNESSEE:** Beekeepers in Tennessee are reporting higher than average honey yields so far this year. The main nectar and pollen sources for June were clover, sourwood, sumac and wildflowers. Beekeepers are reporting retail sale of honey at an average of \$12.00 per pound. Beekeepers are still reporting supply chain issues with acquiring equipment and supplies. One of the main issues being reported is the shortage and cost of containers for bottling their honey.

**TEXAS:** During the month of June temperatures were normal to slightly above normal across most of the state. Precipitation during June was slightly below normal across most of the state. The exception being Northeast Texas where precipitation was slightly above normal. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, the Panhandle and most of West Texas had abnormally dry to a few spots of extreme drought conditions for the month. The remainder of the state shows mostly normal conditions with a few spots that were abnormally dry.

Unlike Spring, Summer arrived early in Texas which it often does. Temperatures were already in the triple digits by time Summer got here. The wildflower bloom was fading fast as the end of the month approached. But even with the heat, beekeepers are seeing good foraging options for the bees this spring and into summer. The wildflower bloom across most of the state was very good.

Commercial beekeepers are reporting that their bees are looking healthy. According to beekeepers, there have been only minimal colony losses this year. Varroa mites seem to be under control.

Few prices exist to establish a current market price for wholesale white honey. Beekeepers are still seeing a spike in prices caused by increased retail sales due to the Corona virus pandemic. Pricing for single load and immediate delivered honey has jumped to \$1.80-\$1.90 with a few loads at \$2.00 as packers try to meet the retail demand. No one knows how long this will last but at this point most beekeepers are happy to get it.

WASHINGTON: The cool, wet spring weather of May continued into June. Below average temperatures and some additional precipitation continued to limit the growing degree days for developing crops and floral sources. Some heavy rains caused delays in hay cutting and other field work early in the month. Starting slowly the cherries began to gain some color, and the flowering of summer vegetables picked up. As the cherry harvest began to pick up, the asparagus harvest. Once the rains slowed hay harvest picked up slowly.

WISCONSIN: Temperatures for the month of June alternated between warm and cold with many warm days in the middle of the month and with little rain. For the most part, beekeepers report a normal, healthy population of bees. Beekeepers report wild foliage for their bees includes Clover, wild parsnips, Basswood and Black Mustard and other wildflowers. Honey production has started and has only garnered a small amount. Demand for honey is good at the retail level and fairly good at the wholesale level. Prices are generally unchanged.
