## COLONY, HONEY PLANT AND MARKET CONDITIONS DURING FEBRUARY 2023

APPALACHIAN DISTRICT (MD, PA, VA, WV): February's temperatures were above normal for most of the month in the Appalachian District and went out on a roller coaster high and low temperature week. Highs in the lower 70's followed by highs in the 30's two days later and back up to the fifties. Meteorologists are stating this is the fourth warmest winter on record according to statistics at Baltimore Washington airport. Snow fall is currently on a path to set a record low for the year with the district only receiving 6-7 inches of measurable snow this winter. Due to the warmer temperatures, Beekeepers have been able to check on colonies earlier than normal and finding some bees bringing in pollen, which is fairly rare for February. Current plant bloom is approximately 2 weeks ahead of normal. A few beekeepers have lost some colonies and are busy purchasing new bees, but others have healthy ones. There continue to be reports of mites in some colonies. This false sense of spring is here to stay looks to be interrupted by more seasonable temperatures predicted for early March.

ALABAMA: A warm February with lots of rain meant Spring came soon to most parts of Alabama. Henbit, lawn weeds, hollies, callery pear, and Prunus spp. all bloomed at various times of the month. Multiple frames of capped brood were present in colonies, as their build-up appeared normal, possibly early. Reports of swarms started early February in southern portions of the state; drone brood was also present. Mite treatments during winter appeared to be effective. Beekeepers reporting issues with varroa were typically those that did not perform treatments during fall and winter. Alabama Extension hosted its annual state meeting early in February and local clubs continued to host introductory lectures throughout the state.

ARIZONA: No report issued

ARKANSAS: During the month of February temperatures were well above normal across most of the state. Precipitation during February was well above normal across most of the same area. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, Arkansas had normal soil moisture conditions across most of the state. Too few prices exist to establish a current market price for wholesale white honey.

CALIFORNIA: February started off relatively dry, and California beekeepers succeeded in placing hives in almond orchards for pollination. But weather remained unusually cold, and with time, the rains resumed. "February was not the kindest month for us," a beekeeper said. "Most hives were placed in the almond orchards by mid-month as almond bloom was just beginning in many parts of the valley," another beekeeper said. "Bees were collecting pollen and some watery nectar from the almonds until the afternoon of February 21 when strong winds reduced bee flight to almost zero. There was no significant bee flight for the next 8 days due to very cold windy weather."

The lack of flight time required beekeepers to feed colonies protein supplements and sugar syrup more than usual. Some hives in the north valley were covered by snow for several days while most almond orchards were in full bloom. The insufficient pollination that resulted could lead to a smaller almond crop than expected.

Going forward, beekeepers plan to move colonies into cherry orchards, as well as plums, prunes, berries and hybrid cauliflower seed crops in the Salinas Valley. "That acreage was severely negatively impacted by the Salinas River flooding and drowning much of that crop, and it cannot be replanted in time due to soil testing regulations after the flooding," a beekeeper said. "Hopefully we will be able to move the rest of our colonies into sage honey locations as we have had enough rain in those areas," he said. "We will begin to make divides as soon as we can get queens, but those queens are being delayed due to weather constraints and lack of a good drone supply."

Due to the abundant rains in California, the prospects for a good honey crop have been greatly improved, a beekeeper said. "I am sure that honey demand is good, but most beekeepers do not have much to sell due to the poor 2022 honey crop," he said.

FLORIDA: Temperatures and precipitation were about average for the month. There were few natural sources of food for the bees. There were some areas with varying amounts of wildflowers, maple and Spanish Needle. Supplemental feeding was necessary for most hives for the month. Orange blossom began late in the month and will continue into March. It will be March before any orange blossom honey is pulled. Blueberry pollination in parts of Florida and Georgia began in January and is expected to continue into March. The number of Florida bees transported to California for almond pollination may have been as much as 50% lower than the number sent last year. A large supply of stored almonds resulted in less hives needed for pollination this year. Then two hurricanes in the fall not only destroyed many hives but also ruined large areas of Brazilian Pepper in the state. Brazilian Pepper is an important source of food for most Florida bees. Nutritionally deficient hives led to a larger percentage of Colony Collapse Disorder for many beekeepers. Normally most hives lost to CCD are offset by splitting and building more hives. The losses this year were in many cases impossible to replace, possibly reaching 50% or more for some beekeepers. The freezing temperatures around Christmas also contributed to a more stressful environment for the bees and less natural sources of food. There was practically no honey produced in Florida during the month or stored at the end of the month.

GEORGIA: The month of February had its ups and downs with weather. Half the month was wet and cold, the other fairly nice. Beekeepers report that the bees are in good shape and have been getting supplemental feed. The weather has been good for plants and wildflowers for the Spring flow. Buyers are receiving their bees to continue to grow and produce more honey and others are separating the bees making new hives with the purchased queens for sale. Honey supplies are low for the small producers and larger ones only have bulk available and that volume is getting low until the new crop comes in.

IDAHO, COLORADO, UTAH: During the month of February temperatures were normal across Western Idaho, Eastern Idaho was a little below average. Utah, Colorado had little cooler temperatures than normal. Precipitation for February was below average for Idaho, Colorado, and Utah.

According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, in February Idaho had moderate drought to an area of severe drought along the southern border. Utah is currently under moderate to extreme drought conditions with most of the state under severely dry soil conditions. Colorado has an area of normal soil moisture in the center of the state with areas of moderate to severe drought in the western and eastern portions of the state.

Most producers have their hives in California for the almond pollination and they will be there until around March-April depending how the weather is. Other producers have their hives in storage for the winter.

Prices for the month of February were between \$2.80 and \$3.20 per pound with a mostly price of \$2.85-\$3.00 for Idaho, Colorado prices are too few producers reporting to determine a market. Prices for locally sourced honey in Utah are \$2.80-\$3.15 per pound with mostly \$3.00.

ILLINOIS: The weather for February has been mild with a few cold days of rain or snow. Temperatures were warm enough that bees took cleansing flights. Most beekeepers report their bees in good condition. Beekeepers are going to meetings and checking and repairing equipment and report that lots of packages are being ordered. Soft Maple, Pussy Willows and dandelions are beginning to bloom. Demand for honey is good and demand exceeded supply at the retail level and demand was fairly good at the wholesale level. Prices are generally unchanged.

INDIANA: The weather has been good for February with warm temperatures and above average precipitation. Beekeepers are checking on the bees from winter. Most beekeepers report that their bees are in good condition, while others report some dead hives. Beekeepers are going to meetings, checking and repairing their equipment and preparing for the spring. Demand for honey is good at the retail level and fairly good at the wholesale level. Prices are generally unchanged.

IOWA, KANSAS, MISSOURI, NEBRASKA: No report issued.

KENTUCKY: The month of February began with icy-cold temperatures, more floods, and cooler weather typical of this time of year. Honeybees stayed in winter cluster until around the middle of the month when uncharacteristically warm temperatures arrived and lingered until the end of the month. Honeybees have been bringing in many sources of pollen: red maple, willows, crocus and snowdrops, Lenten Roses, and dandelion are just a few of the species that have been blooming steadily without break for two weeks. With these warm temperatures, honeybees have been active, and many hives need additional room. Many educational opportunities are in the planning stages.

LOUISIANA: During the month of February temperatures were well above normal across most of the state. Precipitation was above normal. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, Louisiana had normal soil moisture conditions across most of the state. Too few prices exist to establish a current market price for wholesale white honey.

MICHIGAN: No report issued.

MINNESOTA: During the month of February temperatures were normal across the entire state. Precipitation for February was a little above normal for the north end of the state, the south end of the state had far above normal precipitation.

According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, in February the northern part of the state had normal to abnormally dry soil moisture. The central part of the state had moderately dry soil conditions. The southern part of the state had moderate to an area of severe drought conditions.

Most producers have their hives in California for the almond pollination and they will be there until around March-April depending on how the weather is, other producers have their hives in storage for the winter.

Prices per pound in Minnesota were \$2.80-\$3.75 with mostly price of \$2.80-\$3.00 for locally sourced honey for the month of February.

MISSISSIPPI: Wet conditions and cold temps have kept the beekeepers out of the hives and waiting for the weather to change. Supplemental feeding is doing well and treatments to prevent mites are doing well. Prices are still high and volume is low until the Spring crop arrives.

MONTANA: No report issued.

NEW ENGLAND: No report issued.

NEW YORK: February 2023 brought changeable weather in New York State. Most of the month had above average temperatures. Witch hazel, willow, and alder plants were blooming. Many beekeepers were able to inspect hives and apply miticides and feed growing colonies. Beekeepers are eager to use the newly approved NYSDEC extended-release oxalic application for mite control. The end of the month brought sustained below normal temperatures, along with snow and ice, causing concern about potential damage to premature budding by plants, and early brooding by the bees. Honey demand/sales were good with prices holding well, although some beekeepers report they may deplete stock before the 2023 honey harvest.

NORTH CAROLINA: No report issued.

NORTH & SOUTH DAKOTA: Topsoil and subsoil moisture, generally short to adequate all around, generally adequate. Most bees were in their winter homes as beekeepers prepared hives for pollinizing activities in various locations this spring. Many are in California. By mid-February, the first flowers began to open. Cold winter weather has caused delays in development and overlaps between varieties. The wet, cold weather has caused numerous inconsistencies and variations in bloom development. While the supply of bees and hives was generally adequate in most areas, placement of the hives was made difficult by crop development variations. Further cold and precipitation limited bee activity during the peak of the bloom. Gaps in pollination, caused by the weather has made crop forecasting difficult.

OHIO: Northwest Ohio: February has been sunny, warm with periods of heavy rain and very little snow. Maples and skunk cabbage has started to bloom with natural pollen starting to come in the last week of the month. Some beekeepers have not opened any colonies but thermometers in hives indicate brood rearing has started. Honey prices remain stable, \$5.50-\$6.50 wholesale and \$9.00-\$11.00 retail.

West Central Ohio: February weather has been sunny about 1/3 of the days, other days have been cloudy. The overall temperatures were above normal, with many days in the sixties, a few days in the seventies. Because of the above normal temperatures, along with about 4 plus inches of rain, skunk cabbage started to bloom 3 weeks early, along with Silver & Red Maple trees and the Willow trees family. The honeybees have had above average amount of pollen to store in their hives. The honeybee colony queens have been laying eggs since New Year's Day and with above average temperatures and above average pollen and nectar flows, colonies are strong if the varroa mites and viruses remain under control.

OKLAHOMA: During the month of February temperatures were above normal across most of the state. Precipitation was about normal. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, Eastern Oklahoma had normal soil moisture to moderate drought conditions. Central Oklahoma had moderate to extreme drought conditions. Western Oklahoma had mostly extreme drought conditions. Too few prices exist to establish a current market price for wholesale white honey.

OREGON: No report issued.

SOUTH CAROLINA: No report issued.

TENNESSEE: Tennessee has not had any reports of high bee losses for the winter at this time. Beekeepers will be receiving a survey the last week in March to record their losses for the past year and last year's honey production. Late March is normally when we record overwinter losses. Nectar and pollen sources for the month of February were red maple, elm, ornamental pear, ornamental cherry, dandelions, henbit, deadnettle and wildflowers. February was warm and wet bringing early nectar flows. Beekeepers are still having issues with obtaining containers to pack honey. Most beekeepers have sold out of last year's honey, having sold it for an average of \$12 per pound.

TEXAS: During the month of February temperatures were about normal across the state. Precipitation during February was slightly above normal across most of the state. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, soil moisture conditions for February showed East Texas had mostly normal to areas of abnormally dry conditions. Central and West Texas had areas of normal soil moisture to moderate drought with an area of extreme drought to exceptional drought continuing around the San Antonio area. Far West Texas had normal to abnormally dry conditions. Too few prices exist to establish a current market price for wholesale white honey.

WASHINGTON: February was very dry with periods of very cold weather. Growers worked on pruning and other winter activities on the days with warmer weather. The snowpack in the mountains is still holding less than normal water. The snowpack of most areas of the Cascades which supply the primary growing regions of Central Washington near the mid-Columbia region ranged from 75% of normal to 100% plus, but most were in the 80-90% range. More snow is needed to bring the water supply back to normal.

WISCONSIN: The weather for February fluctuated between very cold to very warm and it was not as sunny as usual. Snow and rain were more than average. Beekeepers have been checking on the bees to see how they are doing. Some beekeepers are deciding to feed their bees. Beekeepers are also going to meetings, checking and repairing equipment, ordering packages, preparing for the spring and participating in beekeeping classes. Demand for honey is good at the retail level and fairly good at wholesale level. Prices are generally unchanged.
